

APPARATUS FOR CUTTING PHOTOGRAPHS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 46,099, dated January 31, 1865.

To all whom it may concern:

the process is a slow one. The present inventible parts into the position shown in Fig. 1. ton consists in a new apparatus for effecting the desired result, the pattern being firmly held or clamped upon the paper while the latter is being cut into the desired form, so that neither can slip nor move, whereby the work can be much more rapidly done and with greater certainty than heretofore.
