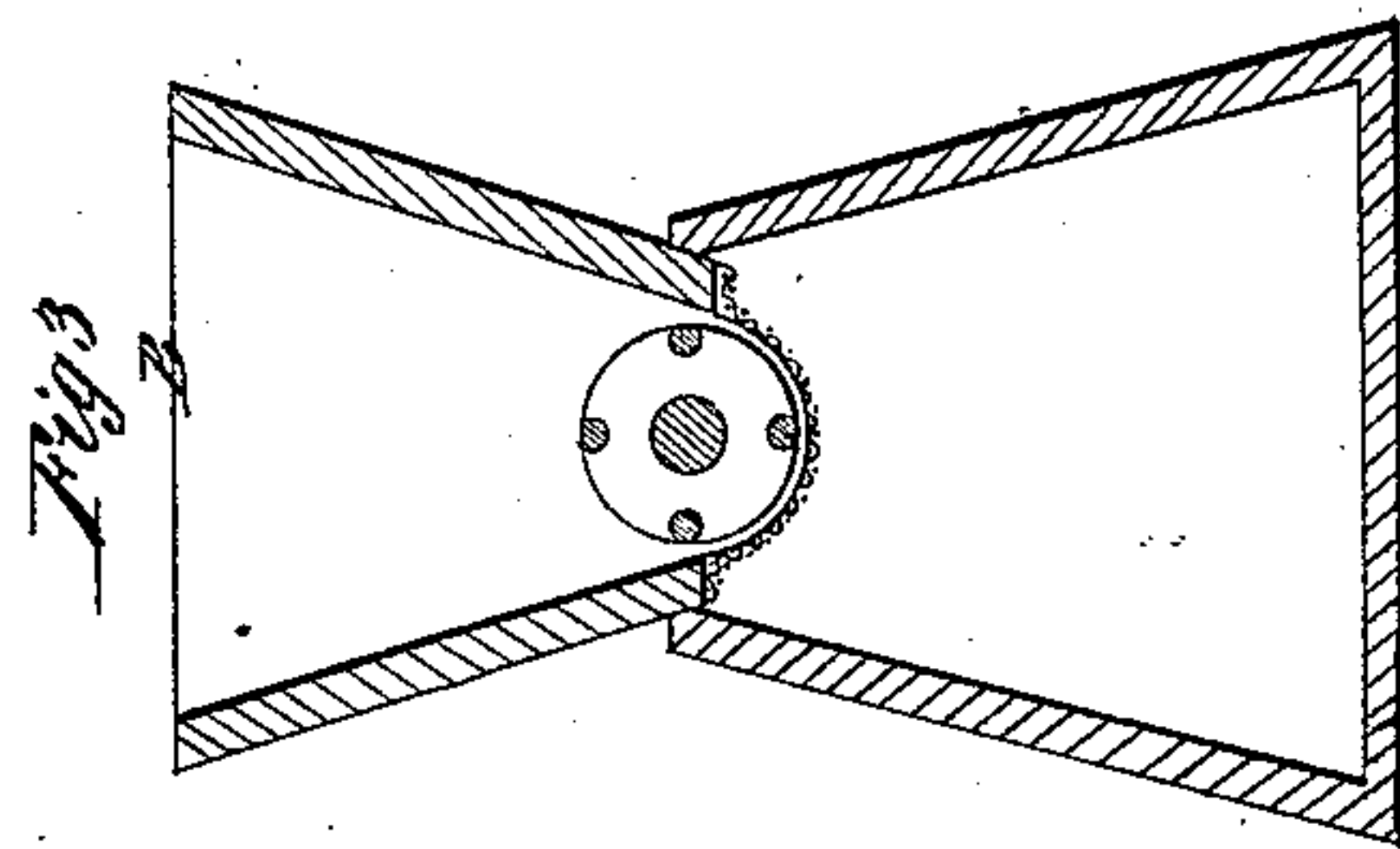
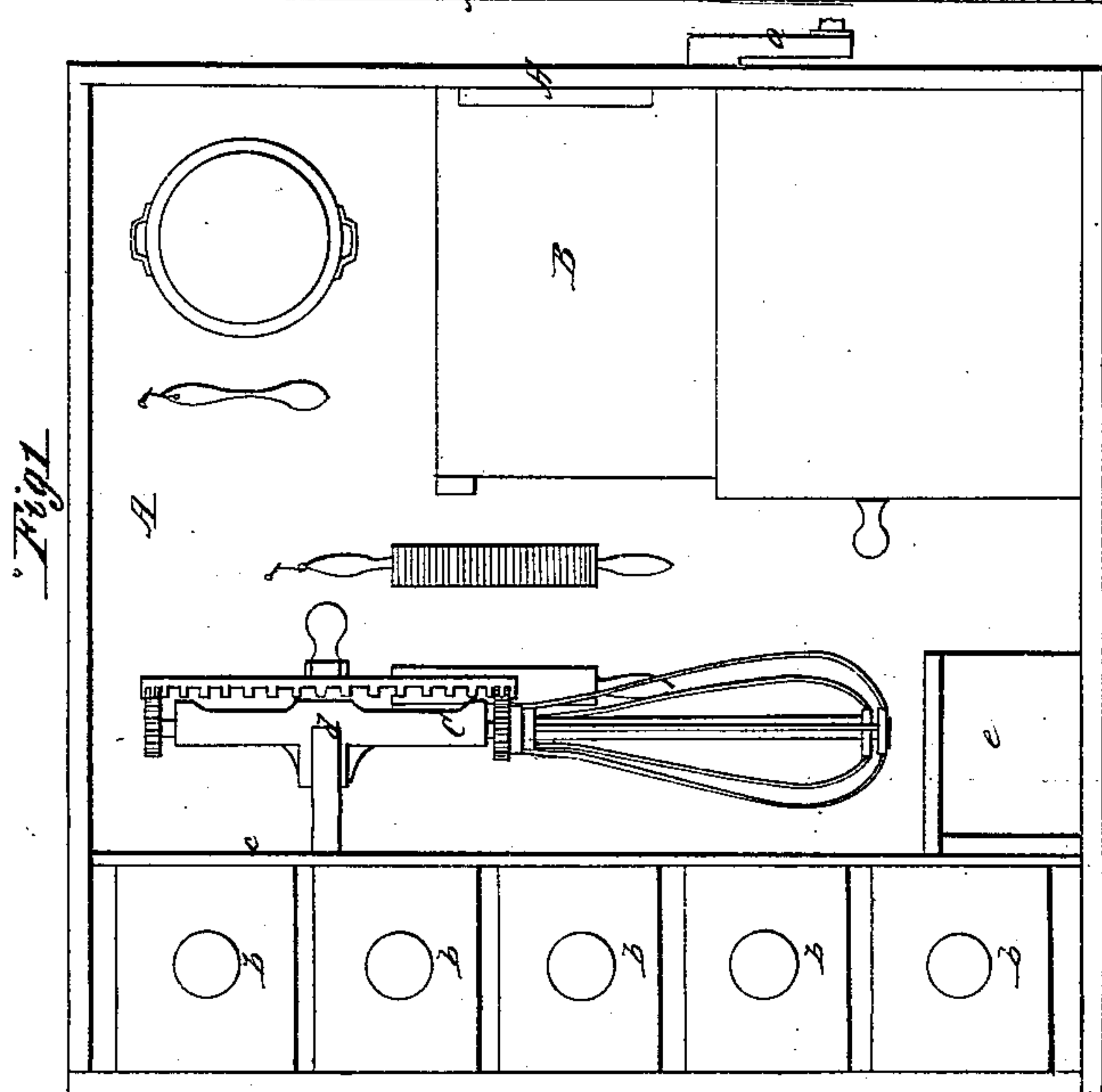
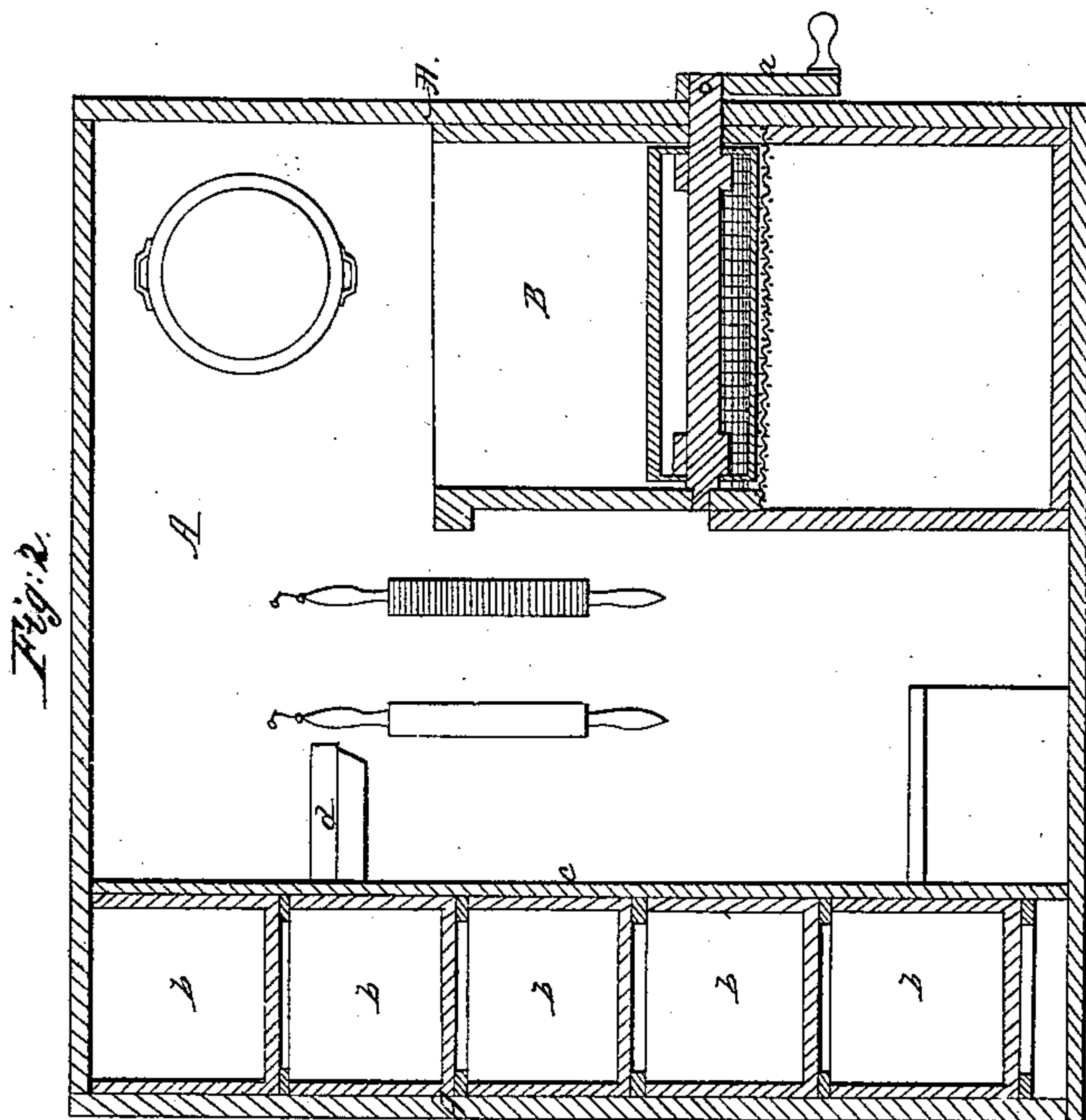

JEROME BILLINGS, OF BRIGHTON, MASSACHUSETTS.

CULINARY CABINET.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 53,260, dated March 20, 1866.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JEROME BILLINGS, of Brighton, in the county of Middlesex and State of Massachusetts, have invented a new and useful Culinary Apparatus or Combination; and I do declare the following to be a full, clear, and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, making part of this specification, and in which—

Figure 1 is a representation or front view of my invention with its doors open or removed. Fig. 2 is a vertical section of the same, taken in rear of its egg-beater; and Fig. 3, a section of its flour-sifter.

The object of my invention is to produce an article of domestic use which shall combine or contain within itself or its case a number of culinary articles which are usually scattered about in different places or apartments, the whole combination forming what I term in the trade the "cook's cabinet."

The apparatus is a very useful one to cooks or housekeepers, as it occupies little space, contains in a small compass and ready at hand a number of indispensable articles, and can be transported from one room or place to another with ease and celerity. For camping-out purposes it is also useful and appropriate.

In the drawings above referred to, A denotes a rectangular box or case, which is open at front, and may be provided with doors to open

laterally, or with a large cover to lower down in front of the said case.

Within the said case A and situated at one end thereof, as shown in the drawings, is a rotary flour-sifter, B, whose crank or handle *a* extends outside of the case A and into such a position that it can readily be operated by the hand of a person.

Situated at the opposite side of the case A is a set of spice-drawers, *b b b*, &c., they being retained in place in part by means of a partition, *c*, extending from top to bottom of the case A. A small shelf, *d*, is attached to the upper part of this partition, as seen in the drawings, and to which an egg-beater, C, is secured, a movable support, *e*, being placed under it for reception of the dish containing the eggs to be beaten.

The case A may further contain rolling-pins, spoons, &c., as occasion may require.

The above-described apparatus is a great favorite with all cooks and housekeepers who have used it, and may be the means of creating a large business.

I claim—

The flour-sifter B, and the egg-beater C, combined with the cabinet A, as specified.
