

D. W. BASHORE, OF ERIE, PENNSYLVANIA.

IMPROVED WASH-STAND AND DESK.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 56,876, dated August 7, 1866.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, D. W. BASHORE, of Erie, in the county of Erie and State of Pennsylvania, have invented a new and Improved Wash-Stand; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description of the construction of the same, reference being had to the annexed drawings, making a part of this specification, in which—

Figure 1 is a perspective view, and Fig. 2 is

a view of the internal structure.

A is a lid, in the usual form, except that it has the slant and structure of a writing-desk lid; B, C, and D, three tanks, constructed with lids—one, B, for hot water, one, C, for cold washing-water, and one, D, for drinking-water. D, Fig. 2, shows the lid open.

f is a space made in the construction of the tank B for a heating-lamp. This tank is made of metal and the water heated by simply placing the spirit-lamp under it. E is a space for the waste-water pail; g, faucet-pipe to the hot-water tank; h, faucet-pipe to the middle

tank; i, faucet-pipe to the drinking-water tank; j, wash-bowl, constructed with the usual discharge-pipe, which will empty into the wastewater pail in space E; kand m, doors to shelves for towels, &c.; l, drawer for writing materials, &c.; n and o, apertures for ventilation for the lamp at f when lid A is closed.

The lid A may be closed, the waste-water pail removed from E, and the writer use this space to bring his body near to the stand, and thus use it for a writing table

thus use it for a writing-table.

What I claim as my invention, and desire

to secure by Letters Patent, is-

The arrangement of the water-heating tank B with the other two tanks C and D in a wash-stand, and the construction of the wastewater space E, to adapt the stand to use as a writing-desk, as specified.
