

IMPROVEMENT IN CHIMNEY-HOLDERS FOR GAS-BURNERS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 59,588, dated November 13, 1866.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, ELLIOTT P. GLEASON, of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Chimney-Holders for Lighting Apparatus; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, making part of this specification, in which—

Figure 1 is an elevation of my improved chimney-holder applied to an Argand gasburner, and Fig. 2 is a section of the same.

Similar letters mark like parts in both figures.

The chimney-holder, as represented, consists of a ring, D, fitting the body A of the gasburner, with a number of radial arms, inn, for supporting the weight of the chimney, and at the end of each arm a spring, f, which bears against the chimney I, to hold it securely in its place over the gas-burner; and the invention consists of a holding-spring constructed with a spring-tongue, i, or second spring, the free

end of which extends in an opposite direction from the holding-spring, with the free ends of both bearing against the side of the chimney, for the purpose of giving it additional steadiness on the holder, and at the same time afford a wider range of expansion to the glass.

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The second spring, *i*, is best formed by punching it in form from the body of the spring *f*, in the manner shown, whereby the stiffness of the spring *f* is reduced, and the pressure of the two springs on the chimney is in a measure equalized; but the spring *i* may be formed of a separate piece and riveted to the spring *f*, which may be so reduced in size at the proper point as to produce the same equalizing effect.

What is claimed as my invention is— The equalizing-spring for chimney-holders, constructed substantially as described.
