


IMPROVEMENT IN DICE BOXES.

EDMUND W. QUINCY, OF LACON, ILLINOIS.

Letters Patent No. 60,421, dated December 11, 1866.

The Schedule referred to in these Aetters Patent and making part of the same.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Be it known that I, EDMUND W. Quincy, of Lacon, in the county of Marshall, in the State of Illinois, have invented an improvement in the ordinary Dice Boxes; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawings and the letters of reference marked thereon.

Figure 1 represents a perspective view.

Figure 2, a vertical section.

The nature of my invention consists of a hollow cylindrical box or case, with a cavity A at the upper end, to receive the case, and a foot B, upon which it stands vertically and firmly. Within the case is a piston rod C, with a circular disk D, upon which the dice rest. At the foot of this piston or rod is a flat spring E, fastened to foot of box. This spring causes the rod C and disk D to move vertically, and is operated by the pressure of the thumb on a flat key F attached to the rod, and passing through the slot g h. A glass cover, or receiver-case H, is inserted in the upper cavity A, so as not to interfere with the motions of the disk D, at the same time to confine the dice. The operation of this device is obvious.

What I claim is—

The arrangement of the disk D, and its connection with the flat spring E, by means of the piston or rod C, and the open bottom, which enables an easy renewal of the spring when necessary, all as and for the purposes set forth.
