

IMPROVED MUCILAGE-BOTTLE.

The Schedule referred to in these Xetters Patent and making part of the same.

TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Be it known that I, Dr. WILLIAM W. BEACH, of the city and State of New York, have invented, made, and applied to use a certain new and useful improvement in Mucilage-Bettles; and I do hereby declare the following to be a full, clear, and exact description of the said invention, reference being had to the annexed drawing, making part of this specification, wherein I have represented a vertical section of my said improved mucilage-bottle.

The object of my invention is to obtain a fountain of mucilage that will supply a brush as the same may be required, and to prevent evaporation or escape of the mucilage when not in use, and only to keep the brush itself immersed in the mucilage.

My invention consists in a brush and fountain combined, and constructed in such a manner as to be adapted to the reception of mucilage; and in combination with the same I employ a holder, into which the fountain and brush are placed, the brush being immersed so as not to become dry, and the mucilage in said holder coming above the base of the brush, closes the fountain so that air cannot get in, and hence the mucilage cannot run out. My brush is detachable from the fountain, so as to allow for introducing a new brush, or a brush of a different shape, as occasion may require.

In the drawing, a represents a fountain made partially or wholly of glass, of a suitable size and shape for containing mucilage, and being handled. b is a brush, secured into the mouth of the fountain. I prefer and use a screw-socket, forming the base of the brush, and screwed into the mouth of the fountain a; and c is a hole, communicating through the brush base, so that the mucilage will run out of the fountain gradually, as the dryness of the brush, as used, allows the air to pass in through said hole c. d is a cup or receptacle of a suitable size and shape for receiving the brush and the neck of the fountain, as shown in the drawing. The mucilage will run out of the fountain until it rises sufficiently to reach the base of the brush, and exclude the further passage of air into the fountain. This keeps the brush always in the moist condition required for use, and the fountain setting within the receptacle d prevents exposure of the gum to evaporation.

The receptacle may be shaped as desired, and, for convenience on the desk, may be heavy, to prevent being upset, or it may be used as a weight to retain papers in place.

What I claim, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is-

A fountain-brush for mucilage formed substantially as shown, with a brush at the mouth of the fountain, and an opening through the same into the fountain, as and for the purposes specified.

I claim the receptacle d, in combination with the fountain a and brush b, substantially as and for the purposes set forth.

I also claim a fountain for mucilage, in combination with a brush that is removable from said fountain, so to be changed, for the purposes and as set forth.
