

IMPROVEMENT IN HINGES.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Be it known that we, Samuel Selden and W. J. F. Liddell, of Erie, in the county of Erie, and State of Penusylvania, have invented a new and useful improvement on the Reversible Loose-Jointed Door-Hinge; and we do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description of the construction and operation of the same, reference being had to the annexed drawings, making a part of this specification, in which—

Figure 1 is a perspective view, and

Figure 2 is a vertical section through the centre of the joint.

A C and D B, bands of the hinge; ee', point in the pin-hole, where there is a stop to prevent the pin from falling through; f and g h, sections of these stops in the pin-holes, represented solid with the bands; ii', the pin of the hinge; J, K, L, and M, leaves of the hinge; n o, point of the stop where the hinge is reversed.

The operation of the improvement is as follows: Fig. 1 represents the arrangement of the leaves for a left-hand door. The pin i i' stops at f. For a right-hand door the band r is placed upon S, and the pin stops at g h. The stops f and g h may be movable plugs, and may be nearer the lower ends of the pin-holes p or q. In this case the pin can be longer, and the stops would be held in place by friction or otherwise. The stops may also be screws. In the left-hand door the stop would be held in a thread cut in the barrel at r, and for a right hand door the plug would be held in the same way at t, fig. 2.

What we claim as our invention, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is-

The stop in the band of the loose-jointed reversible door-hinge, constructed as specified, and for the purposes set forth.
