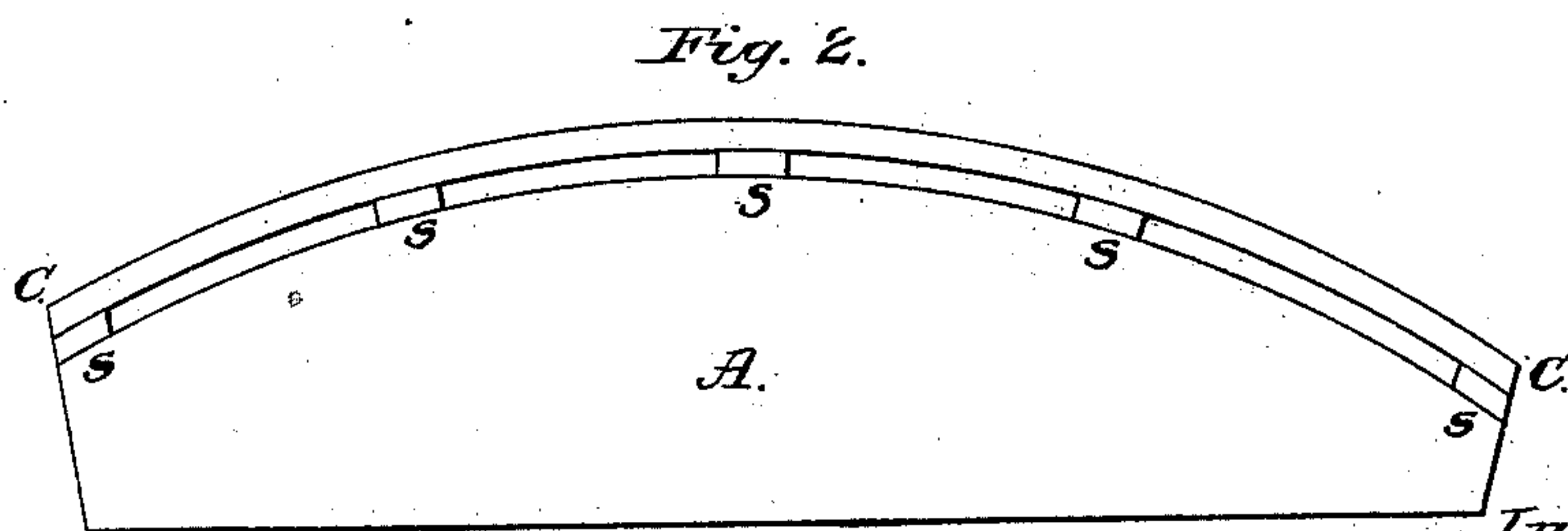
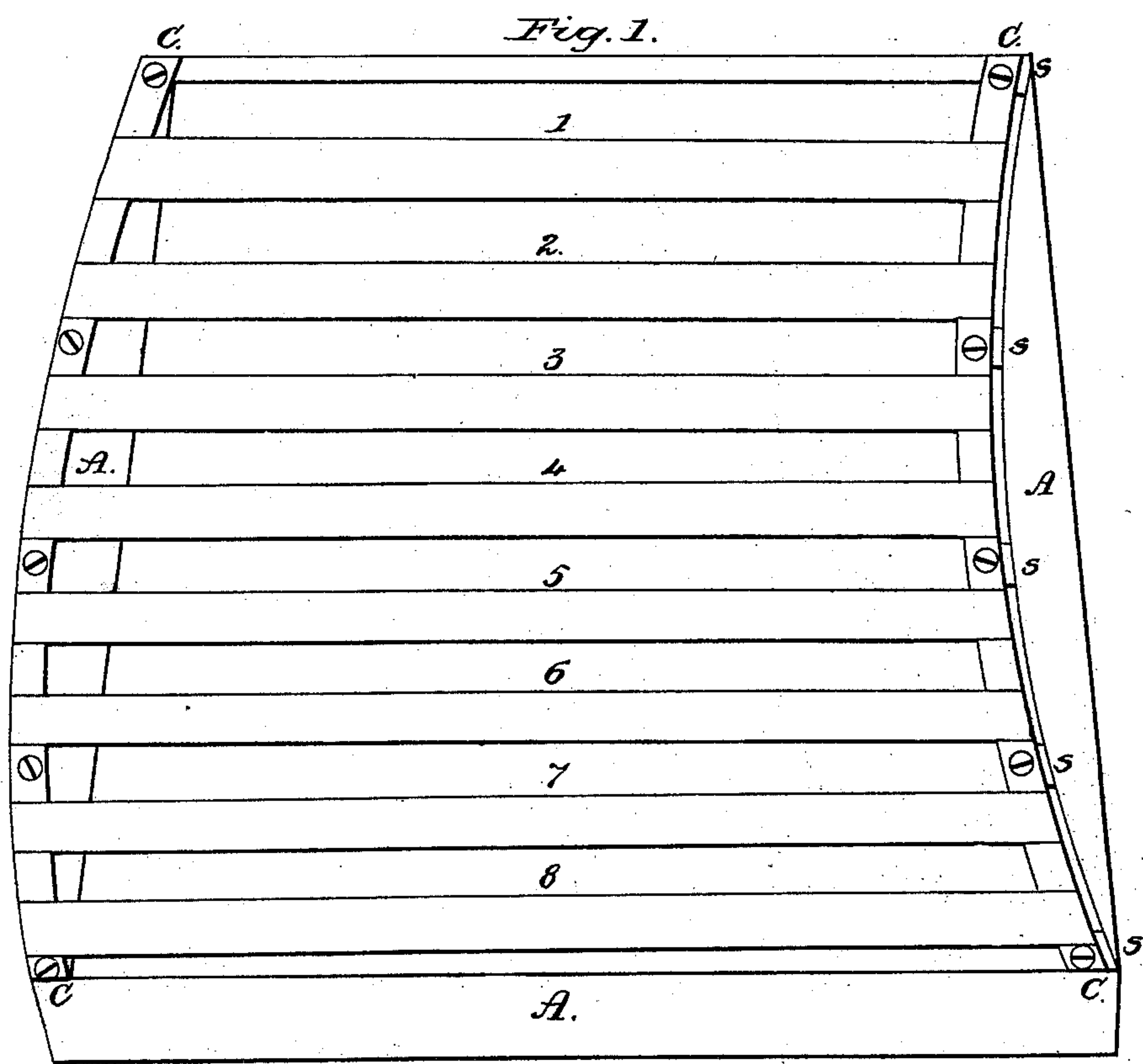

IMPROVED SPRING-SEAT.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Be it known that I, JOSEPH I. MABBETT, of the city of Titusville, in the county of Crawford, State of Pennsylvania, have invented a new and improved Elastic-Spring Seat, for chairs, sofas, saddles, and it also may be used for beds, or carriage-seats, &c.; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full and exact description of the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawings and the letters of reference marked thereon.

Figure 1 represents my invention in the form of a chair-seat.

A A A is a frame, of wood, the sides made in a convex form, as shown in drawing. C C C C are two rods of iron attached to the frame A A A, by the screws S S S S S. The rods do not rest on the frame their whole length, but on supports, as shown at S S S S S; the screws passing through these supports.

A, Figure 2, is an end view of the frame, showing the position of the rods C C.

1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, are endless bands of "rubber" or elastic cloth, which pass around the rods C C. On the top of these bands a covering of cloth is placed. In a saddle the elastic bands would be attached to a frame and then covered with leather.

What I claim as my invention, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is as follows, to wit:

I claim the frame A A A, in combination with the rods C C C C, and the elastic bands 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, when the same are constructed as described in the aforesaid combination for the purposes set forth.
