GEORGE DARE AND DIANA DARE, OF AUBURN, NEW YORK.

IMPROVEMENT IN PAPER BAGS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 71,143, dated November 19, 1867.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that we, GEORGE DARE and DIANA DARE, of Auburn, in the State of New York, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in the Mode of Manufacturing Paper Bags; and we do hereby declare that the following is a true and exact description of the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, and to the letters of reference marked thereon, in which is represented a piece of paper of oblong shape, showing the manner of folding the same.

The nature of our invention consists in so folding an oblong piece of paper, longitudinally and transversely upon each side of its center, that the paper, when pasted together at its sides, will form a bag with square bottom, the superficial measurement of which shall be the same as the mouth of the bag, thus rendering it stronger, or less liable to give way or wear out.

a a are the longitudinal folds, b b the trans-

verse folds, and cc the oblique folds. The paper is now put on a former, and the sides pasted or glued together, when the bag is complete.

Having thus described our invention, what we claim, and desire to secure by Letters Pat-

ent, is—

The manner of folding a piece of paper upon each side of its center, for the purpose of forming a bottom, the superficial measurement of which shall be the same as the mouth of the bag, substantially for the purpose set forth.
