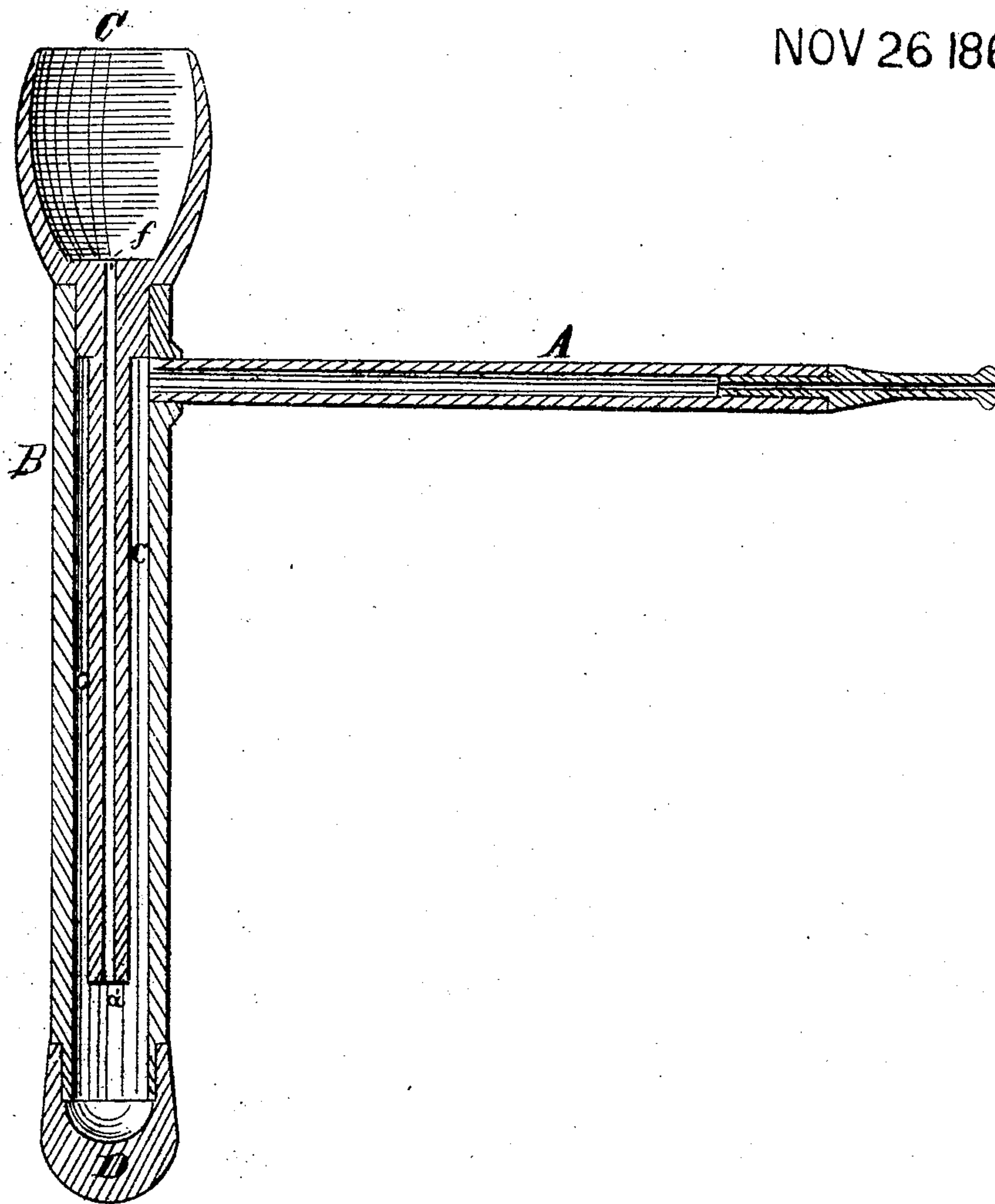

TOBACCO-PIPE.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Be it known that I, J. B. STOCKTON, of Edmonton, in the county of Metcalfe, and State of Kentucky, have invented a certain new and useful Improvement in Tobacco-Pipes; and I do hereby declare that the following is a clear, full, and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, and to the letters of reference marked thereon.

The nature of my invention consists in so constructing a pipe that whilst enjoying its soothing effects, the more deleterious ones are avoided.

To enable those skilled in the art to make and use my invention, I will proceed to describe its operation and construction, which is as follows:

In the drawings—

Figure 1 shows an elevation of my pipe, and

Figure 2 a section of the same.

A is the stem or mouth-piece; B is the outside tube, to which it is attached; C is the top bowl, the receptacle for the tobacco, and to be attached to B in any suitable mechanical manner, readily attached or detached. To the lower part of C, and entering or communicating with it, is a hollow tube, *a*, extending down almost to the bottom of B. To the bottom of B is secured a detachable bowl, D.

The operation is as follows: Say the pipe is "loaded," and, as usual, the charge is fired and suction commences, the smoke will be drawn down the opening L, in tube *c*, and will pass up around said tube *c*, between it and the inner walls of outer tube B, and be drawn into the mouth through the orifice or mouth-tube A. Down through the opening or inside of hollow tube *a*, ashes may fall, as also the nicotine, and both drop into the bowl D. In this way both of these may be removed at pleasure, whilst the smoke, in its course to the mouth, becomes cool.

Having thus described my invention, what I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

A smoking-pipe, constructed, arranged, and operated in the manner as shown and described and for the purpose set forth.
