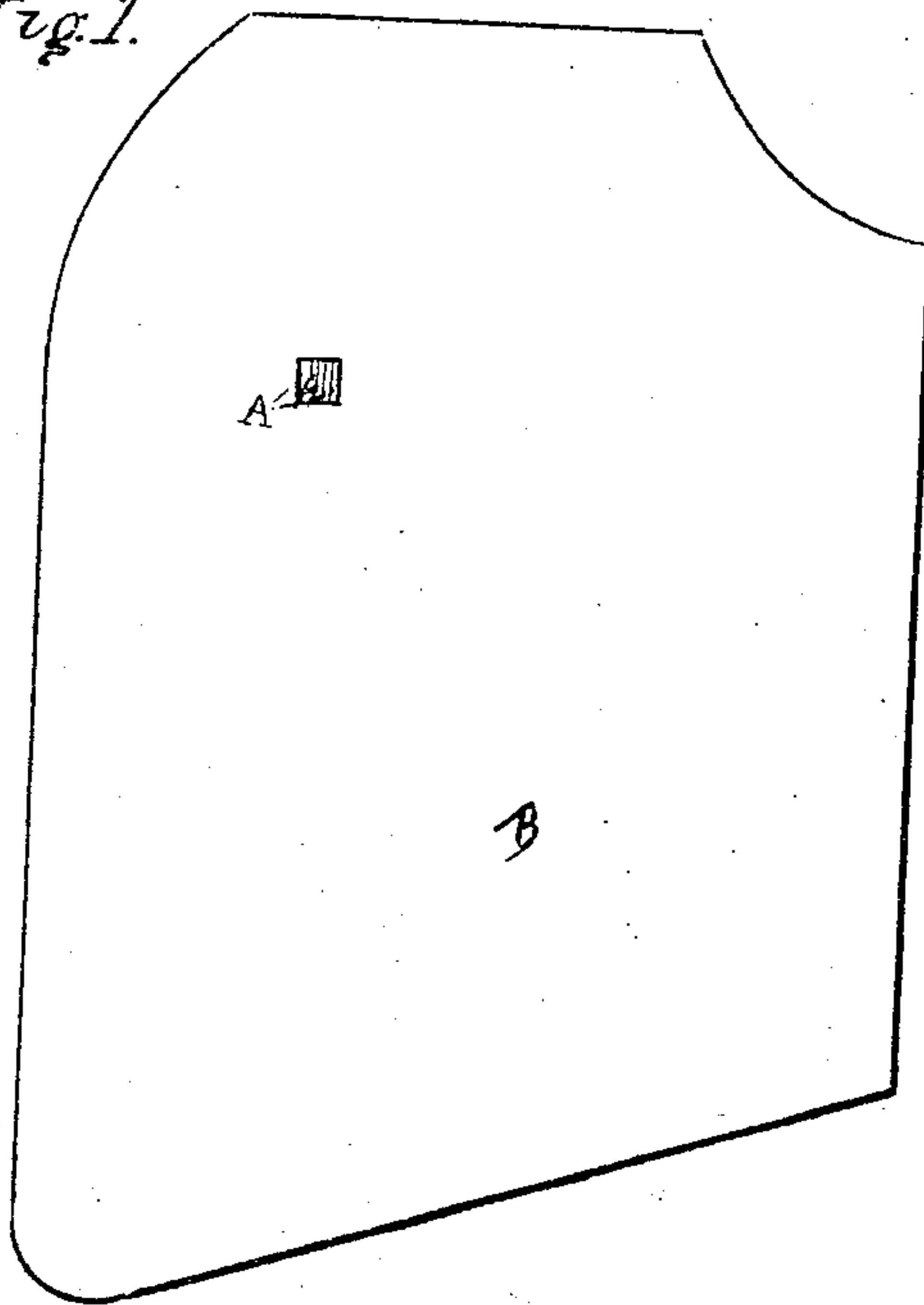

IMPROVEMENT IN PENCIL-HOLDERS.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Be it known that I, JONATHAN SMITH, of Tiffin, in the county of Seneca, and in the State of Ohio, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Pencil-Holders; and do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, and to the letters of reference marked thereon, making a part of this specification.

My invention consists in an oblong metal tube, provided with an opening in its side, near the upper end, around which opening is a tight-fitting rubber band, said tube and band being inserted in the vest of a person, between the lining and outside.

Figure 1 of the annexed drawings represents a section of a vest, showing the upper end of the tube, inserted as above described.

Figure 2 shows a section of the garment with the tube therein.

Figure 5, the tube and band.

Figure 6, a horizontal section of the tube, showing the opening and band.

Figure 7, the upper end of the tube, and its teeth, by which the tube is held in place in the garment.

This tube A is made of a suitable size for an ordinary lead-pencil, and with the opening in its side, as before described, with a rubber band, G, around the opening, so that, as the pencil is inserted, this band prevents it from slipping out of place. After the band is around the tube, and the tube within the garment, the teeth *e e* are bent downwards, after having been passed through the lining.

What I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The elongated tube A, with an opening in its side, around which opening and tube is an India-rubber band, G, said tube being provided with teeth *e e*, for securing it within the garment, for holding a pen or pencil, as set forth.
