IMPROVED SOAP.

The Schedule referred to in these Tetters Patent and making part of the same.

TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Be it known that we, G. W. Slagle, J. L. Miller, and H. C. Hoy, of Washington, in the District of Columbia, have invented a new and useful Improvement in the Process of Manufacturing Soap; and we do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description of the same.

Take ten pounds best rosin soap; four pints alcohol, ninety-five per cent.; two ounces borax, dissolved in

aqua ammonia; one pound aqua ammonia; two ounces beef-gall; four ounces pumice-stone.

Place the whole in a retort, and let it boil ten minutes. After it comes to a boil, continue to stir until it begins to chill, in order to prevent the pumice from settling at the bottom.

This soap is intended for removing grease, fruit, or acid-stains, and restore the color to the cloth. It may be also used as a toilet-soap, as it will remove tan, and is excellent for the skin.

What we claim as our invention, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is-

The mode of manufacturing soap from the ingredients, and substantially in the manner set forth.
