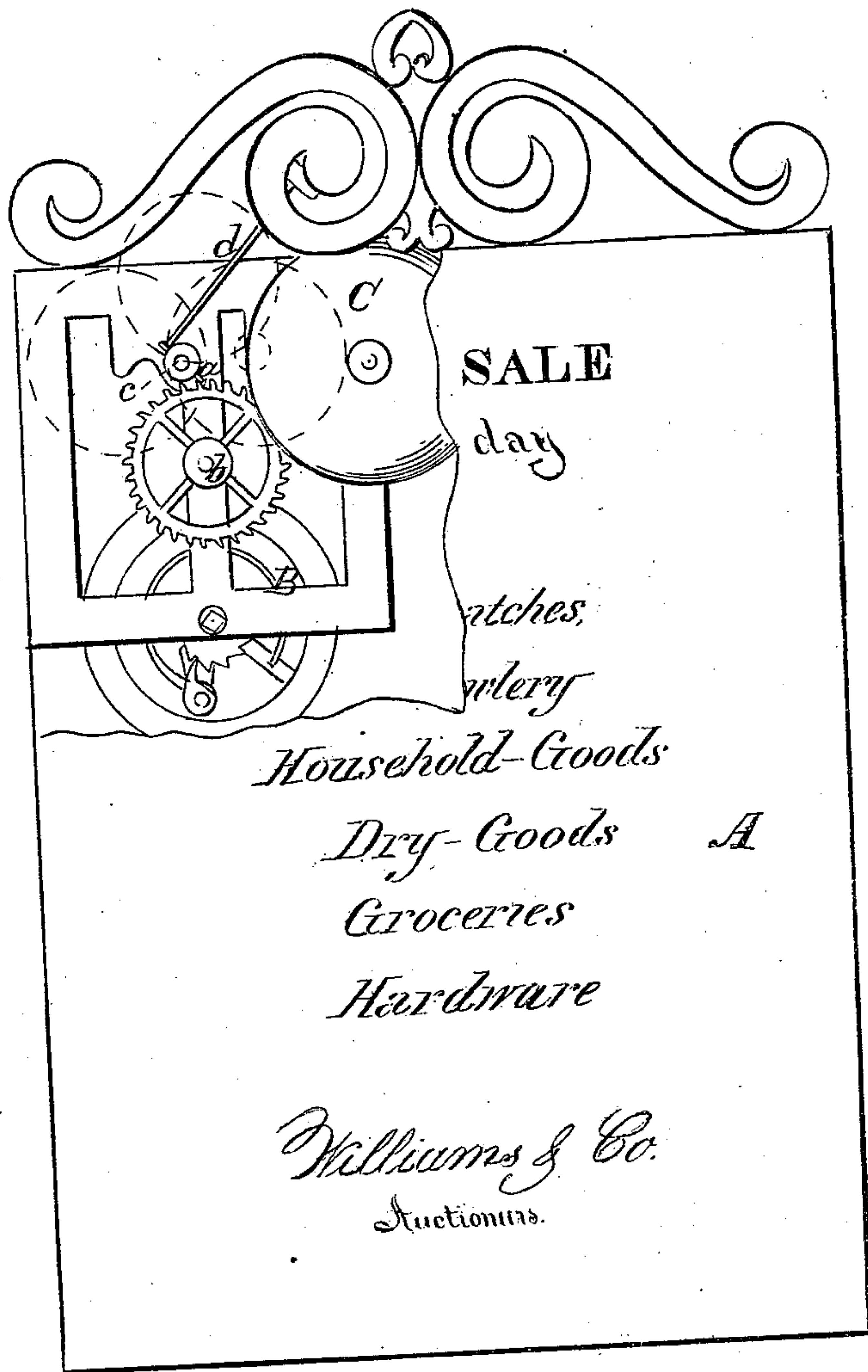

IMPROVEMENT IN ADVERTISING DEVICES.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that we, CYRUS PEABODY and PATRICK H. DELANEY, both of Detroit, in the county of Wayne, and State of Michigan, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Advertising-Alarms; and we do hereby declare the following to be a full and correct description of the same, sufficient to enable others skilled in the art to which our invention appertains, to fully understand and construct the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, which makes part of this specification, and which is a front elevation of our device.

The nature of our invention consists in providing a common advertising-board or frame, of any kind or shape, with a clock-work, which operates a bell, so as to continuously ring, and thus call the attention of passers-by to the board or frame.

A, in the drawings, may represent an advertising-board or frame, to the back side of which, in any convenient place, may be attached a clock-work, B, which, by means of a toothed wheel, *b*, operates a projection,

a, on a rock-shaft, *c*, to which a hammer, *d*, is attached. This hammer strikes a bell, *C*, suitably attached to the clock-work and frame.

When the clock-work is started, the bell will be rung continuously, faster or slower, according to the arrangement of teeth on wheel *b*, or the arrangement of the clock-work, and the attention of the passers-by will be drawn to the advertising-board.

Having thus described our invention,

What we claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The combination, with an advertising-board or frame, of a bell-striking clock-work, substantially as and for the purposes set forth.
