


IMPROVED CHAIR FOR CHILDREN.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, J. H. APEL, of Boston, in the county of Suffolk, and State of Massachusetts, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Children's Chairs; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, which will enable others skilled in the art to make and use the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, forming part of this specification, in which—

Figure 1 represents a plan or top view of my inven-

tion:

Figure 2 is a side elevation, partly in section, of the same.

Similar letters of reference indicate like parts.

This invention has for its object to prevent the chairs of children from falling over while the children sit at table. Many children have been injured by the tipping back of chairs, and as their chairs have to be higher, in order to bring them within reach of the table, the danger of falling, as well as the subsequent injury, will be greater than on ordinary chairs.

My invention consists in connecting the arm-supports of the chair with the table by means of chains

and screw-clamps, so that thereby the chair will be fastened to the table, and cannot fall.

A, in the drawing, represents a table, of suitable

construction.

B is a child's chair, or any other kind of a chair.

By means of screws or pins a a, are chains c c fast-ened to the arm-supports of the chair, as shown.

The other ends of the chain are fastened to screwclamps, D D, which can be secured to the edge of the table, as shown. Thereby the chair is secured to the table, and cannot fall unless the table falls with it.

By putting the pin a more or less backward or forward, the chains can be accommodated to a higher or lower chair.

Having thus described my invention,

I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent—

The combined chains and screw-clamps for fastening children's chairs to tables, substantially as and for the purpose herein shown and described.
