

TOY-CART.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Albert L. Taylor, of Spring-field, in the county of Windsor, and State of Vermont, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Toy-Vehicles; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, which will enable others skilled in the art to make and use the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, forming part of this specification, in which—

Figure 1 is a side view of my invention.

Figure 2 is a plan or top view of the same.

Similar letters of reference indicate corresponding

parts.

The object of this invention is to obtain a means whereby toy wheel-vehicles may be constructed at a much less cost than usual, and still have as neat an appearance as when manufactured in the ordinary way.

The invention consists in a vehicle formed of a body, wheels, and tongue, the body being of peculiar construction, as will hereinafter be more fully set forth.

In the accompanying sheet of drawings—

A A represent the two wheels, and B, the tongue of a toy-cart.

O is the body, composed of a bottom piece, a, and a

side piece, b.

The bottom piece a is formed with round corners, c, and is secured to the axle and tongue by nails, screws,

or other suitable means, and the side piece b is made, in this instance, out of a single strip of thin wood, bent around the sides or edges of the bottom piece a, the lower edge of the strip b being nailed or otherwise secured to the edge of a, and b being sufficiently long to admit of its end being lapped, as shown at d, the lapped edges being secured together by nails or otherwise.

The side of the body may be composed of two strips instead of one, but one strip would be preferable.

The strip b for the side piece is quite thin, so that it may be readily bent.

By this means toy-vehicles may be constructed at a much less cost than by the usual method, and have equally as neat or ornamental appearance.

Having thus described my invention,

I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent—

A toy-wagon, consisting of wheels A, tongue B, and a body, C, whose sides are formed of a single strip of wood, bent, applied, and secured as described, the parts being combined and forming a new and simple article of manufacture, as set forth.
