IMPROVED STOVE-PIPE SHELF AND SAD-IRON HOLDER.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

To whom it may concern :

Be it known that we, HENRY SHIREY and JESSE M. FURMAN, of Fond du lac, in the county of Fond du lac, and State of Wisconsin, have invented a new and useful Improvement in a Combined Stove-Pipe Shelf and Sad-Iron Stand; and we do declare that the following is a true and accurate description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, and to the letters of reference marked thereon, and being a part of this specification.

The nature of this invention relates to an improved construction of a shelf, to be attached to a stove-pipe, and so arranged that it may be secured in any desired position, and when not required for that purpose, it may be placed upon a table, and used to place sad-irons upon.

The invention consists in a peculiar arrangement for securing the shelf to the pipe, and in providing the shelf with handles and legs, as more fully hereinafter described.

In the drawings—

A represents the shelf made of suitable metal, and in any form, and with any ornamentation desired.

B is a circular clamp, made in two sections, hinged together at *b*, and provided with ears, through which passes the thumb-screw C, by means of which the

clamp is adjusted and secured to the stove-pipe in any desired and convenient position equidistant from each other, and around the periphery of the clamp it is provided with perforated lugs D.

The shelf is provided with round projections E, at such distances apart that they will fit into any two of the perforations *a*, in the lugs D, thereby sustaining the shelf at any desired position, in front or rear, or on either side of the pipe.

It is also provided with handles F, and with legs *d*, so that it may be removed from the clamp, and placed upon a table, to be employed as a sad-iron holder, and other like purposes.

What we claim as our invention, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The combination of the clamp B, provided with lugs D and set-screw C, and made in two sections hinged together with the shelf A, provided with projections E, legs *d*, and handles F, when constructed and operating as and for the purpose above described.
