

IMPROVEMENT IN DEVICE FOR ADJUSTING AND BUTTONING NECKTIES.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, OMAR WILSON, of Sandusky City, in the county of Erie, and State of Ohio, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Necktie-Fastener and Buttoner; and do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, and to the letters of reference marked thereon.

The object of my invention is to provide a device by which neckties or butterflies can be easily and quickly attached to the button.

Figure 1 is a perspective of my invention.

Figure 2 is a side elevation of the same, as seen

passing through a butterfly, ready for use.

Letter A represents a common wire or metal rod, one end of which has been bent so as to form a crook, while the other has been flattened out, and then had a notch cut in it, so as to slip over the button, as seen in fig. 2.

This slotted end is slipped over the button, when

the small rubber loop on the back of the butterfly is passed over the top, and then pressed down behind it without any trouble. The other end can then be used to press it firmly and securely down.

By the use of this simple invention much time and annoyance can be saved, and the necessity of straining and pulling upon the slight rubber bands, whereby they are so often broken, is entirely done away with.

I am aware that a device for guiding a loop of a necktie over a button is known.

What I claim, is—

As an article of manufacture, a combined necktiefastener and buttoner, formed of one piece of wire, and operated substantially as set forth.
