IMPROVED REMEDY FOR MURRAIN IN CATTLE.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, HENRY JACOBS, of Fayetteville, in the county of Lincoln, and State of Tennessee, have invented a new and improved Murrain-Remedy; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, which will enable others skilled in the art to make and use the same.

This invention relates to a new medicine for the cure of murrain in cattle, and consists in the combination of the following ingredients, which are compounded in about the proportions set forth, to wit:

One part of spirits of camphor.
One part of spirits of turpentine.
One part of common soda.
Twenty-four parts of water.

The mixture is best kept and preserved without the water, which is added shortly before the medicine is to be given.

This medicine is cheap and simple, and will be found to be very effective and useful.

It is applied in doses of from one to two ounces, according to the nature of the case.

Having thus described my invention,

What I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The murrain-remedy herein described, composed of the ingredients set forth.
