


IMPROVEMENT IN OIL-HOLDER FOR SEWING-MACHINES.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. **96,527**, dated November 2, 1869,

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, A. WILMOT, of Cleveland, in the county of Cuyahoga and State of Ohio, have invented a new Improvement in Oiler-Holder for Sewing-Machines; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings and the letters of reference marked thereon, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent, in—

Figure 1, a perspective view with the oiler in place, and in Fig. 2 a perspective view, the oiler removed.

This invention is designed as an attachment to sewing-machine tables and other machines, for the purpose of holding the oiler used for lubricating the machine; and it consists in a rest having combined therewith a spring-clamp for holding the oiler in the rest, and also a means of attachment to the machine.

In order to the clear understanding of my invention, I will fully describe the same as illustrated in the accompanying drawings.

A is the seat or shelf upon which the oiler rests. It is formed with an attachment, B, to a lug, C, by means of which lug the holder is attached to the machine.

I form the part B so as to partially inclose the oiler, and I attach in any convenient place a spring or springs, *a*, formed so as to grasp the oiler at any convenient point when placed upon the shelf, by preference near the neck, so that the thumb and finger may take the oiler below the clasp; but this clasp may, if preferred, be applied to another point or part of the holder.

While especially adapted for use upon a sewing-machine, it will be evident to those accustomed to the use of other machines upon which an oiler is desirable that this holder may be applied to such machines.

Having fully described my invention, what I claim as new and useful, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

As an article of manufacture, the herein-described oiler-holder, consisting of the rest A, lug C, and their connection B, combined with the clasp for holding the oiler therein, substantially as set forth.
