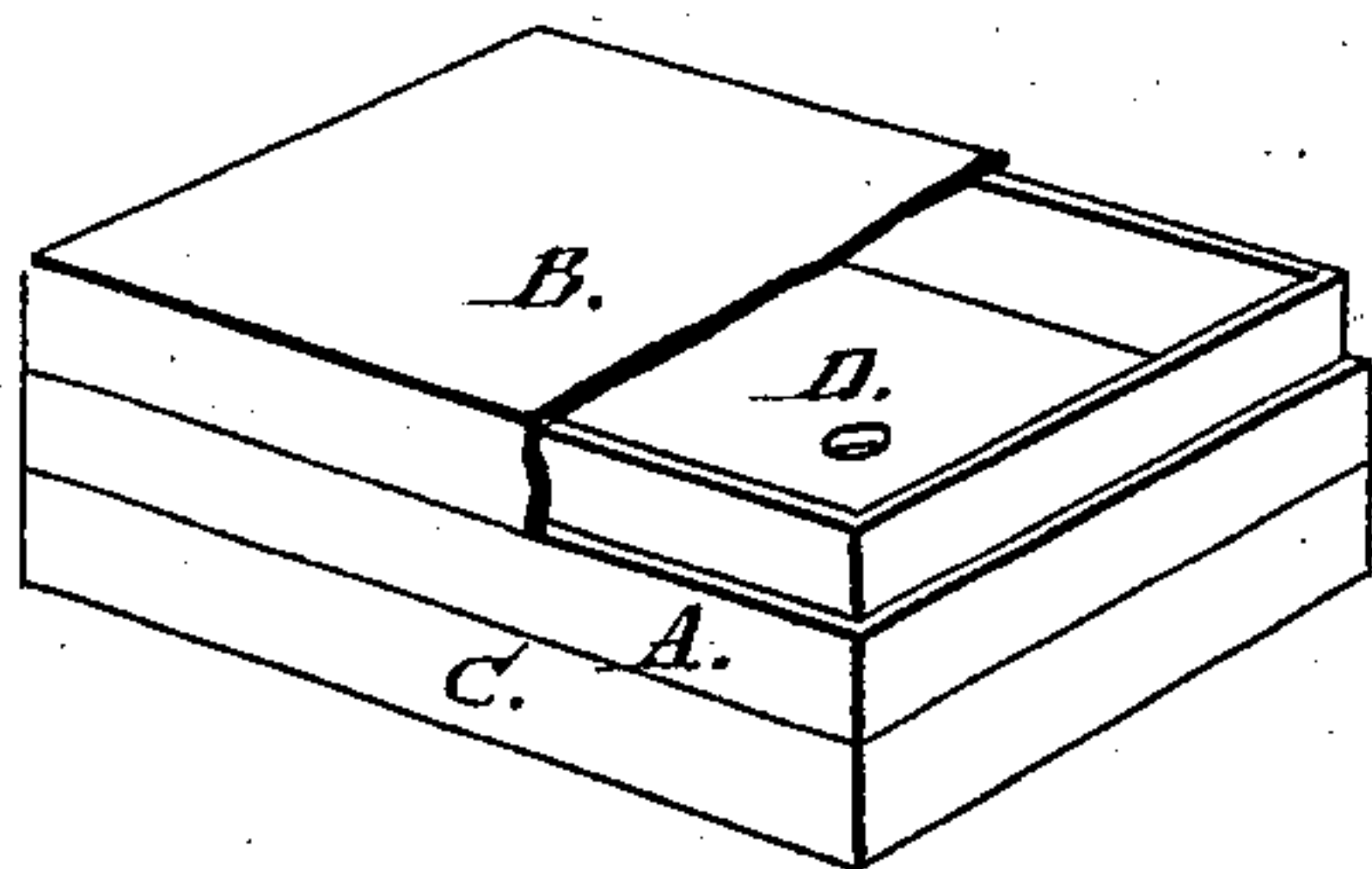
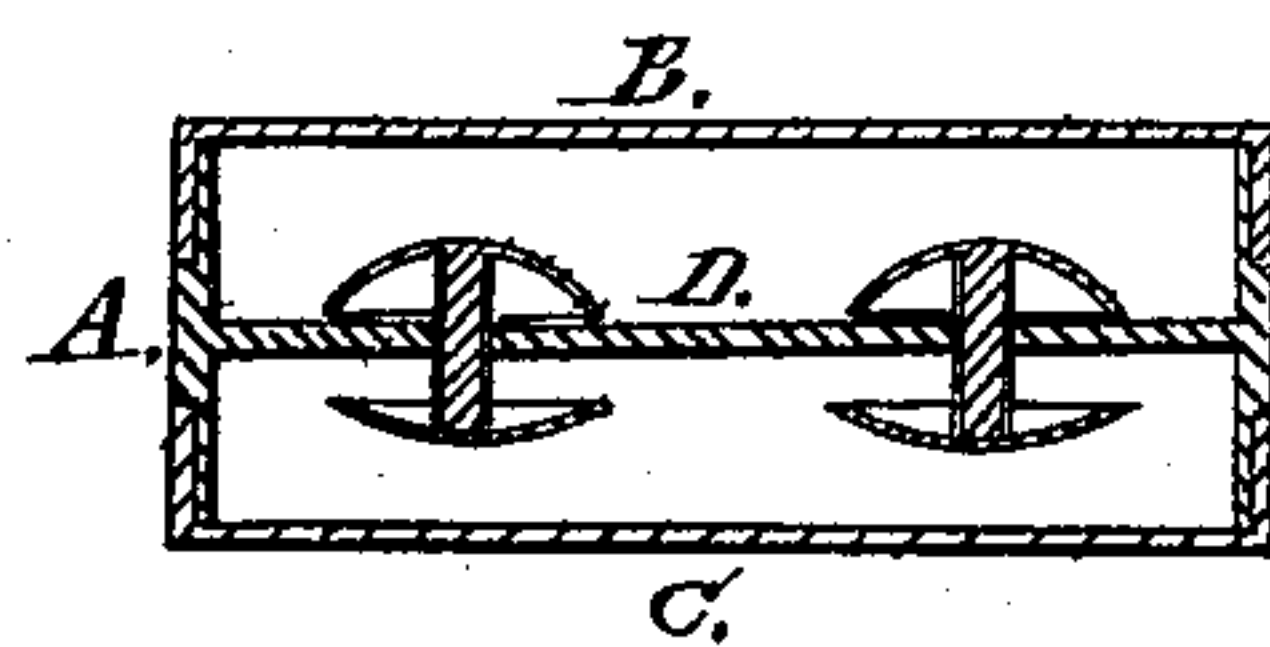

IMPROVEMENT IN JEWELRY-BOX.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, LEVI L. BURDON, of the city and county of Providence, in the State of Rhode Island, have invented a new and useful Jewelry-Box, especially adapted for the protection and display of certain articles of jewelry.

My invention consists in constructing a box with two covers, one at the top and the other at the bottom, with an intermediate partition in the body of the box, forming, as it were, two separate and distinct boxes in one.

The particular use for which these boxes are designed is the reception of such studs, buttons, &c., as have a front and back separately constructed, and connected in a variety of ways at the standard or post, thus rendering them capable of presenting different ornamental faces, so that the front and back may be reversed, giving the effect of two separate studs or buttons, as the case may be; and I do hereby declare the following specification, taken in connection with the drawings furnished and forming a part of the same, to be a true, clear, and exact description thereof.

Figure 1 represents one of my boxes with a portion of the cover removed, showing the interior of the upper section.

A is the body of the box.

B is the cover of the upper section.

C is the cover of the lower section.

D is the partition in the body of the box, and serves as the bottom of both boxes, the distance from it to both covers being as may be desired.

Figure 2 represents the same in vertical section. Parts are lettered as in fig. 1.

In red ink are exhibited two studs or buttons of the character referred to.

Holes of proper size are punched in the partition D, through which the front and back of the buttons are united, having ornamental designs on both sides, which can be exhibited by removing the covers of the box respectively.

Having thus described my invention,

I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent—

The jewelry-box herein described, consisting of the body A, the partition D, and the covers B and C, arranged as shown.
