

IMPROVED CHILD'S CHAIR.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, ABRAHAM HENRY WEHSER, of the city and county of San Francisco, State of California, have invented an "Improved Chair for Children;" and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description of the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, and to the letters marked thereon.

The nature of my invention is to provide a bedroom chair, a rocking-chair, and a toy-holder, all combined, and consists of an upholstered seat with an opening which leads into a chamber beneath, in which is placed a vessel. This receptacle is closed by a door at the back of the chair.

The bottom of the chair is provided with vertical pins, which fit in holes made in the rockers, where they are held by spring catches, and when it is desired to form a low seat, these pins fold up in the bottom of the chair.

When it is desired to form a rocking-chair with this combination, the chair proper, with pins extended, is placed upon a platform with rockers, the pins entering holes, where they are held by spring catches.

Referring to the drawing—

Figure 1 represents a section taken through the center of chair with chamber-door open, and adjustable pins in a vertical position.

Figure 2 is a sectional elevation of rocker.

Like letters refer to like parts.

To enable others skilled in the art or science to which it most nearly appertains to make and use my invention, I will proceed to fully describe its construction and operation.

A is the chair, which is provided with a circular opening, B, which leads into the chamber or depository D.

This is closed by a side door, E.

The circular opening is covered by a cushion, and a toy-holder, F, extends from arm to arm of the chair, which prevents the child from falling out.

To produce a low rocker, the chair is placed on the rockers J, the vertical arms entering the holes K, indicated by dotted lines, where they are held by the catches and springs.

Having thus described my invention,

What I claim, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The chair A, with depository D, door E, pins H, when combined with the rockers J, provided with catches and springs I, as described, for the purpose set forth.
