

## IMPROVEMENT IN WAGON-STEPS.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Morton C. Floyd, of Bloomfield, in the county of Davis and in the State of Iowa, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Wagon-Steps; and do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, and to the letters of reference marked thereon, making a part of this specification.

The nature of my invention consists in the construction and arrangement of a wagon-step, as will be

hereinafter fully set forth.

In order to enable others skilled in the art to which my invention appertains to make and use the same, I will now proceed to describe its construction and operation, referring to the annexed drawing, which represents a perspective view of my step.

A A represent two bars, of any suitable dimensions, between which are pivoted three steps, B, B1, and B2, a convenient distance apart, these steps increasing in length from top to bottom, as shown.

The steps are connected at their edges by means of two pivoted bars, C C, on each side, and on the under side of the upper step, B, near the outer end, is

pivoted a bar, D, which, when the steps are let down, catches on a pin, E, in a recess on the upper side, near the inner edge of the middle step, B1. By this arrangement, all the steps are held in the proper horizontal position.

On the rear side of the upper edge of the bars A A are secured hooks, G G, by means of which the step may be hung on the side or end of a wagon-bed, to enable persons to get into the same. When used, it can be folded up and put out of the way.

Having thus fully described my invention,

What I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The combination of the bars A A with hooks G G. steps B B1 B2, braces C C, bar D, and pin E, all constructed and arranged to operate substantially as and for the purposes herein set forth.
