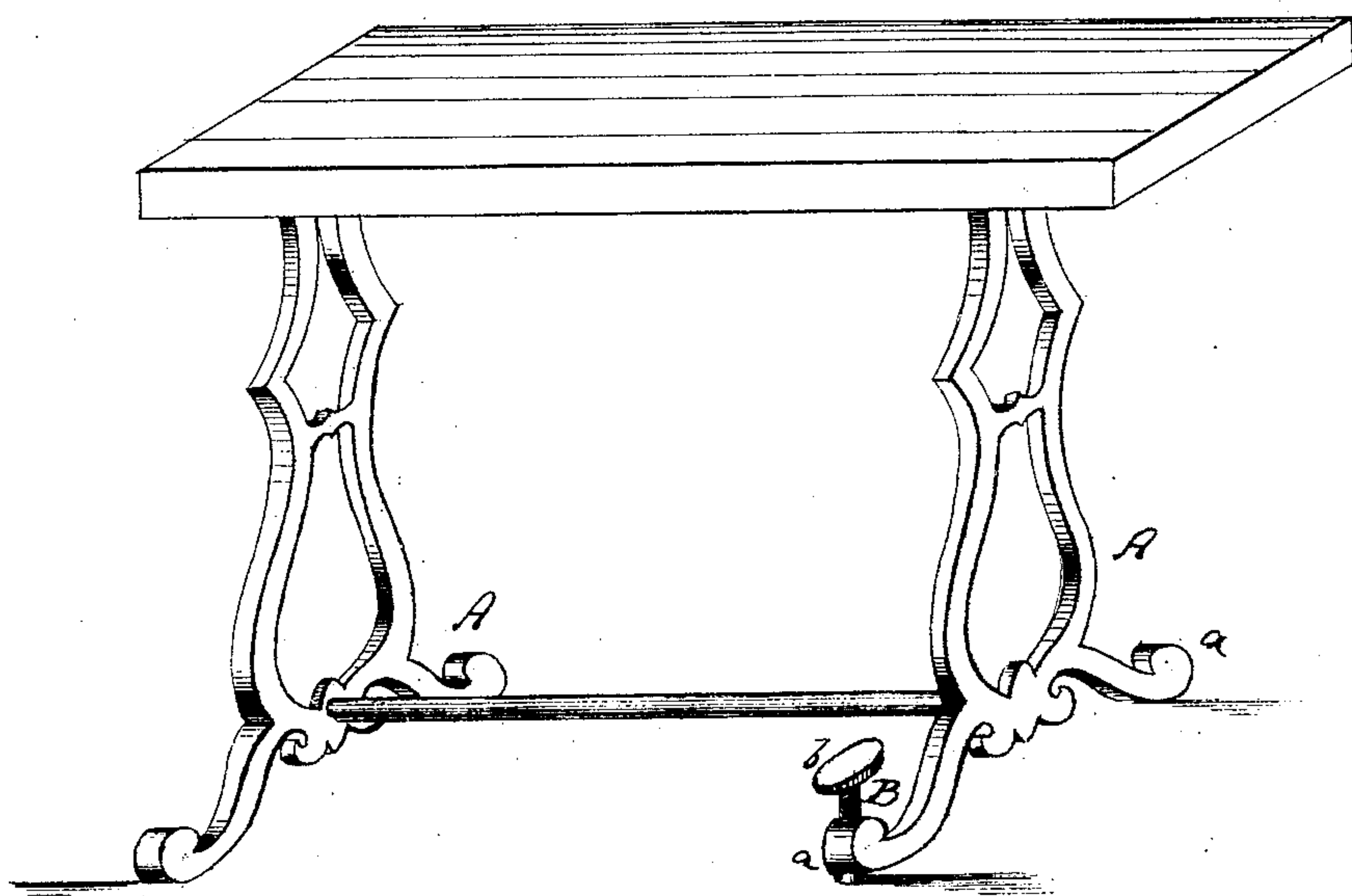
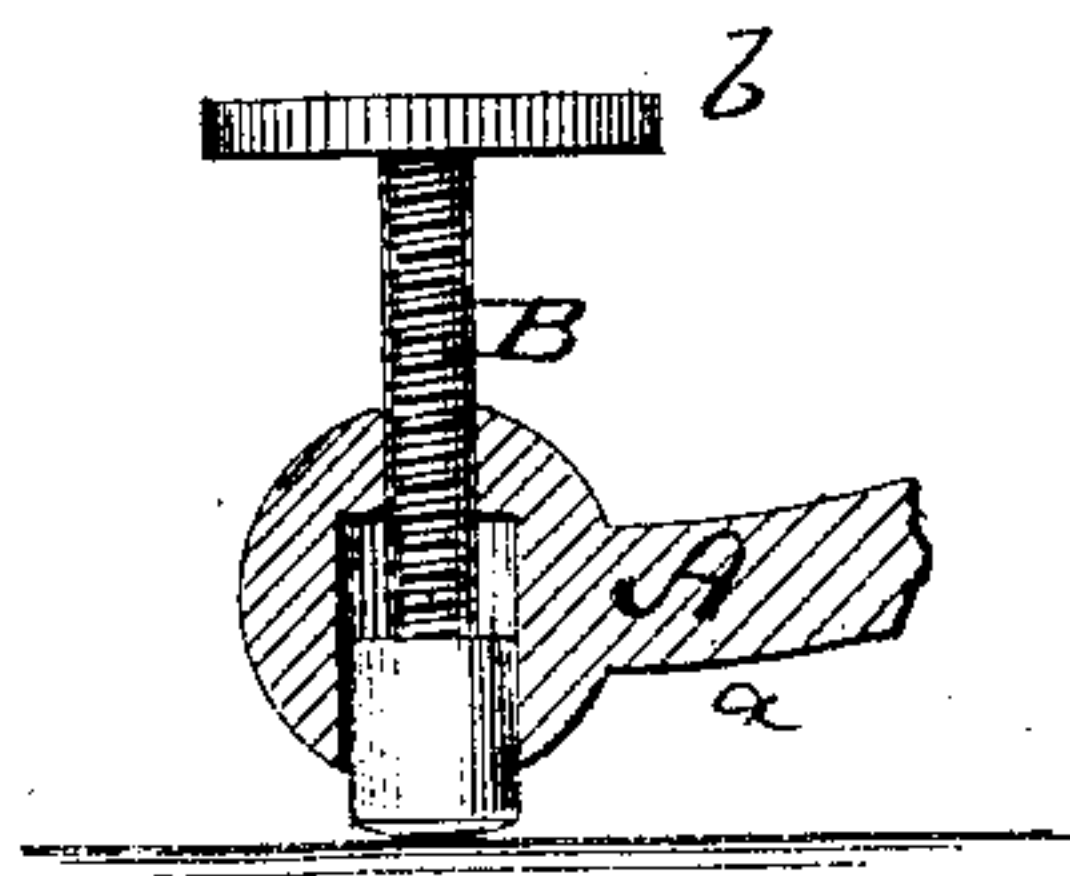

IMPROVEMENT IN SEWING-MACHINE TABLES.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. **108,812**, dated November 1, 1870.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EDWARD L. MORGAN, of Rivesville, in the county of Marion and State of West Virginia, have invented a new and Improved Sewing-Machine Table; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, which will enable others skilled in the art to make and use the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, forming a part of this specification, in which—

Figure 1 represents a perspective view of my improved sewing-machine table. Fig. 2 is a detail vertical section, on an enlarged scale, of the adjustable foot.

Similar letters of reference indicate corresponding parts.

This invention has for its object to provide an attachment to sewing-machine tables whereby the same may be properly steadied on uneven floors, to prevent the rattle of machinery, the consequent inconvenience of operation, and wearing loose of parts.

The invention consists in applying to one foot of the machine a vertically-adjustable

screw-foot, by means of which the desired steadiness can at all times be obtained.

A in the drawing represents the supporting-frame or standard part of a sewing-machine table, made of suitable form, but usually with diverging foot-pieces *a a*, as shown. Through one of these foot-pieces (preferably the one in front on the right-hand side) is fitted a vertical screw, B, with a head, *b*, at the upper end, so that it can readily be turned. The lower end of the screw rests on the floor.

It is evident that by turning the screw the machine can be adjusted to stand steady on uneven as well as even floors.

Having thus described my invention, I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters Patent—

The application, to the table-foot *a* of a sewing-machine, of the thumb-screw B *b*, as and for the purpose described.
