

IMPROVEMENT IN ICE-PICKS AND HOOKS

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that we, Eide H. Schmults and JA-COB BAKER, of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented a new and improved Household Implement; and we do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, which will enable others skilled in the art to make and use the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawing forming part of this specification, in which the drawing represents a side view of our improved household implement.

This invention relates to a new instrument, which can be used for picking and breaking ice, opening all kinds of bottles, and lifting kettles, stove-plates, &c.

The instrument is made of suitable metal, and consists of a main bar, A, with a hook, a, projecting from the upper end of the same.

The lower end of the bar is pointed to form the icepick, b.

Above the ice-pick is an enlargement, c, which is an ice-breaker

The upper part of the bar A is flattened, the end being slightly concave, although not necessarily so.

The hook a can be used for lifting all kinds of vessels or other articles...

Together with the flattened end d of the bar, it can also be used for opening champagne bottles by breaking the wire, and soda-water bottles by carrying forward the cork-fastening of the same.

Having thus described our invention,

We claim as new and desire to secure by Letters Patent—

A combined ice-pick, breaker, and lifting or opening implement, consisting of the main bar, A. book a, flattened end d, enlargement c, and ice-pick b, as described and shown
