

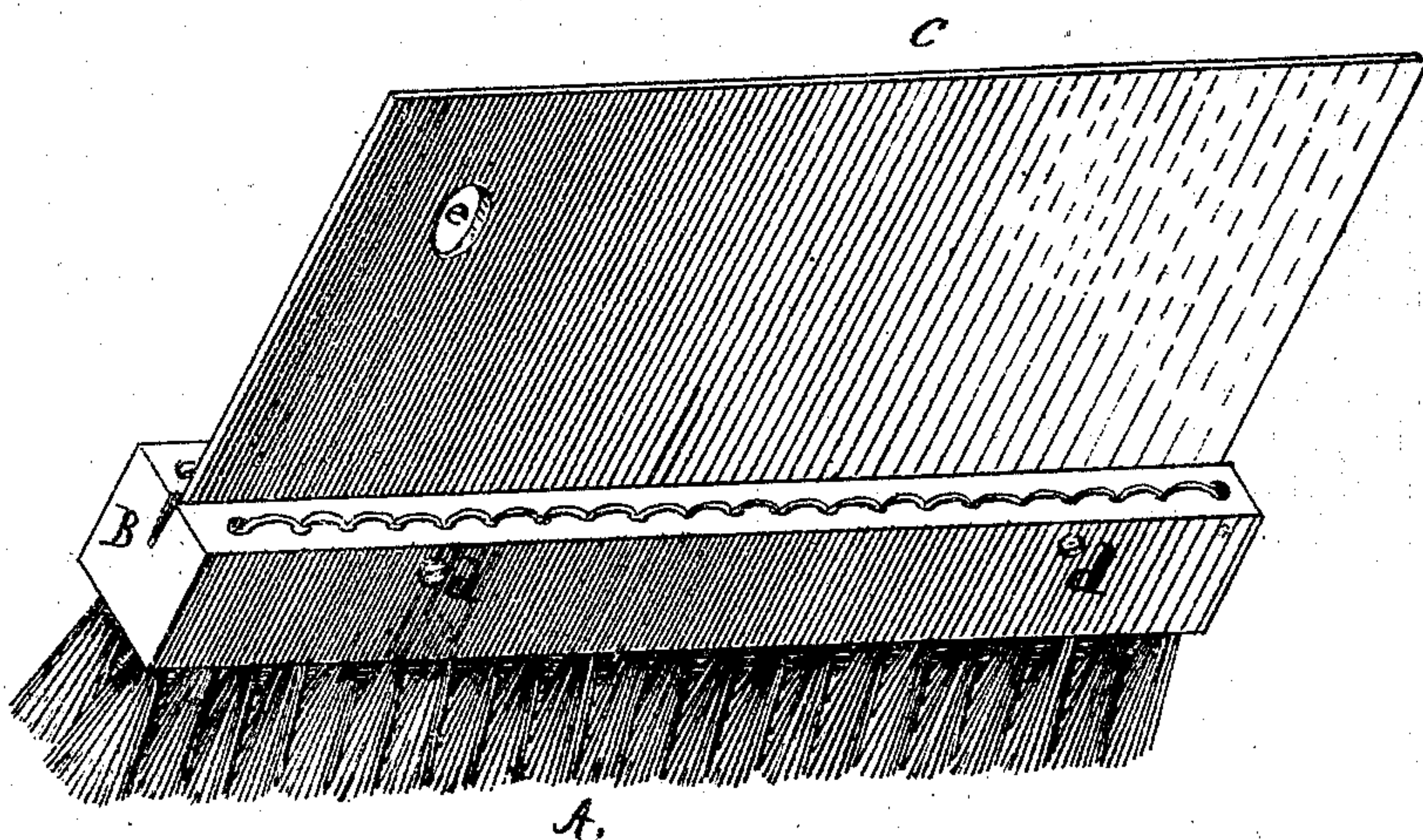

IMPROVEMENT IN BRUSH AND SCRAPER FOR SINKS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 120,090, dated October 17, 1871; antedated October 12, 1871.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JAMES H. OSGOOD, of Boston, in the county of Suffolk and State of Massachusetts, have invented a new and useful Sink-Scraper and Brush, of which the following is a specification:

This invention is a combination of scraper and brush for cleaning a sink or similar place, so arranged with respect to each other that either scraper or brush can be used, as desired, and which forms a very useful kitchen utensil.

The drawing is an isometric perspective of the invention.

A is a brush, with stout stiff bristles, preferably made of Tampico, set into a stout firm back, B, and securely wired there like a nail or hand-brush. It is made without glue, of course, and

preferably without pitch, which would be affected by hot water. In a slot in the back part of said brush is fixed a thin rectangular sheet of steel, C, by means of two rivets, *d d*, which pass through the back of the brush from side to side, and through holes in the steel plate. In one corner of the plate C is a hole, *e*, to hang the tool upon a nail.

I claim and desire to secure by Letters Patent—

The combined scraper and brush described, consisting of brush A, back B, plate C, rivets *d*, all arranged together, substantially as and for the purpose described.
