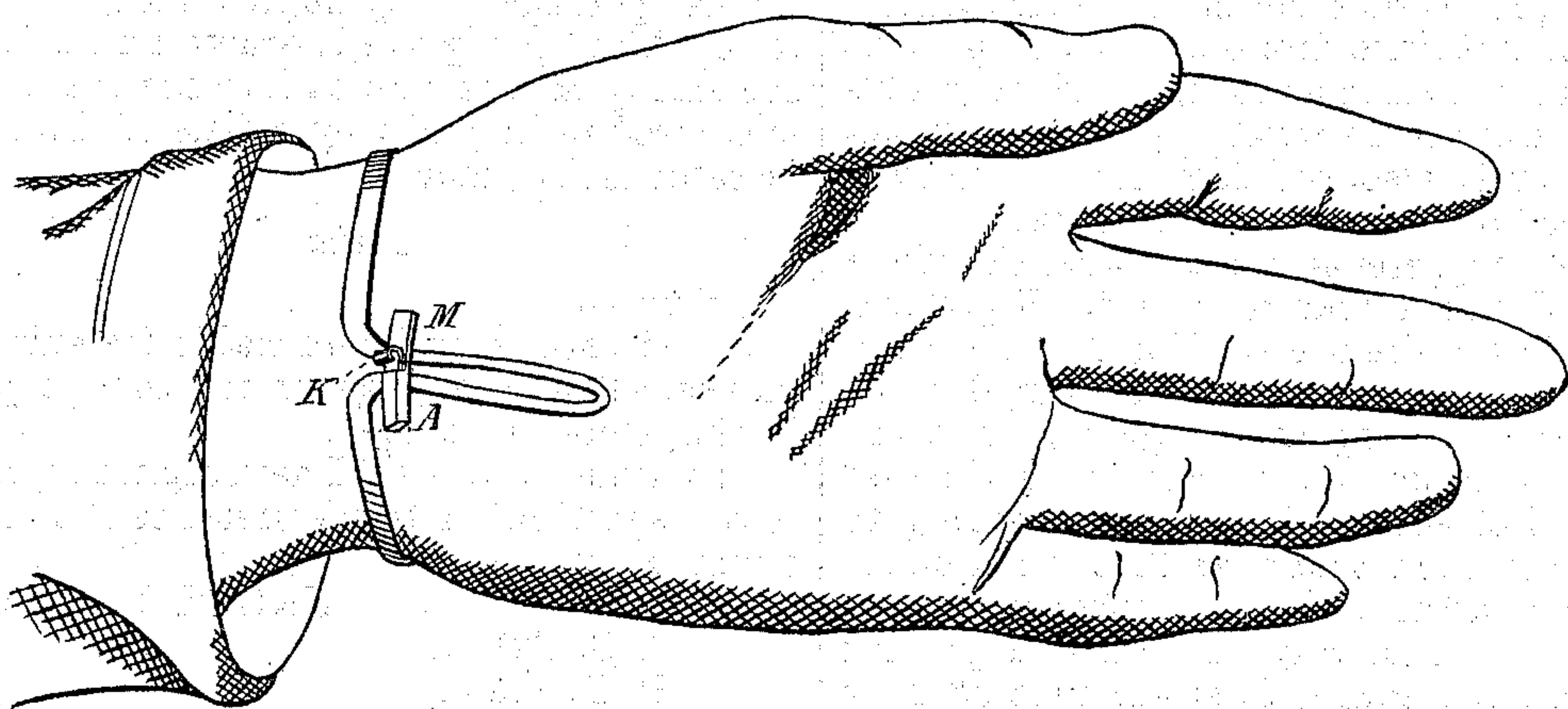

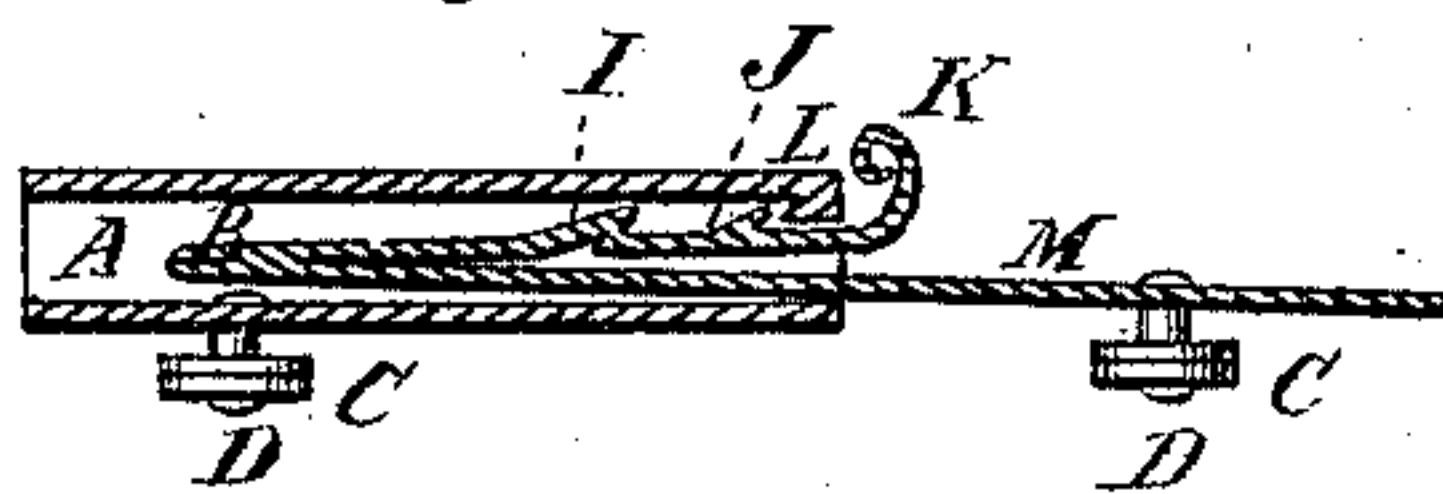

IMPROVEMENT IN GLOVE-CLASPS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 126,657, dated May 14, 1872.

Specification describing certain Improvements in Glove-Clasps, invented by JAMES L. WEIR, of Indianapolis, county of Marion, and State of Indiana.

The object of my invention is to provide a clasp for gloves that can be made fast or loosened with but little trouble; also, to provide catches on the same so that, if a glove is a little tight around the wrist, the clasp can be adjusted to suit; also, the clasp can be removed and placed on another pair of gloves.

Figure 1 represents a hand with the glove on embodying my improvement. Fig. 2 is a section view of the same. Fig. 3 is a washer.

A represents the case that is secured to one side of the opening of the glove. B is the spring. C C are the washers, with slots on one side that secure the case and spring to the glove in such a manner that it can be removed and attached to any other glove. D represents the rivets. I and J represent catches on the spring B, either pressed in or

soldered on. K is the end of the spring B. L is a hook projection on the inside of the case to hold the spring in position. M is that part of the spring B that is secured to one side of the glove.

The operation of my improvement is as follows: After the glove is drawn on the hand, the spring M B is slipped into the case A and is secured in its place by means of the hooks or catches I, J, and L.

Claim.

I claim—

An adjustable and detachable fastening for gloves, substantially as or for the purposes hereinbefore set forth.
