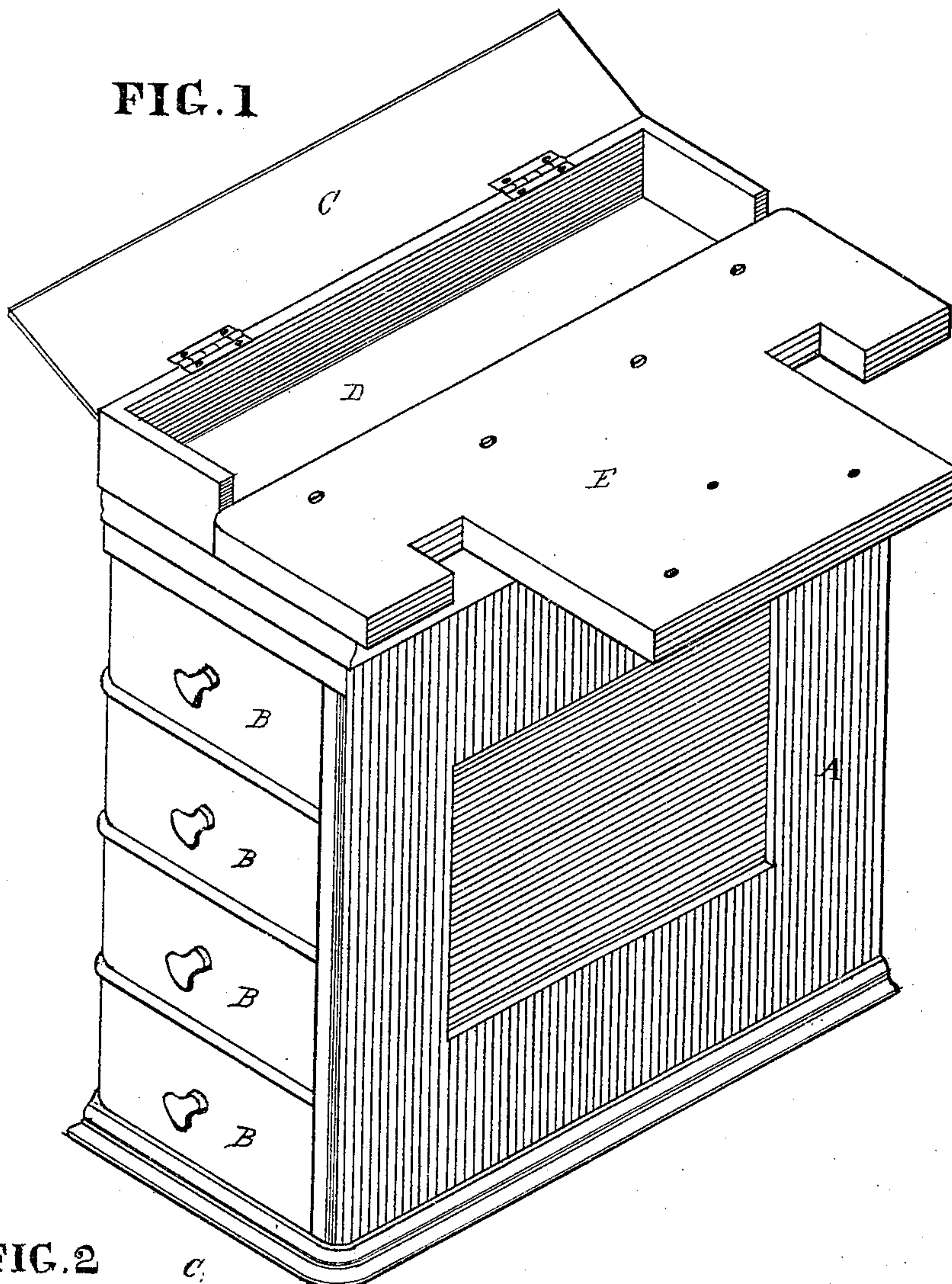
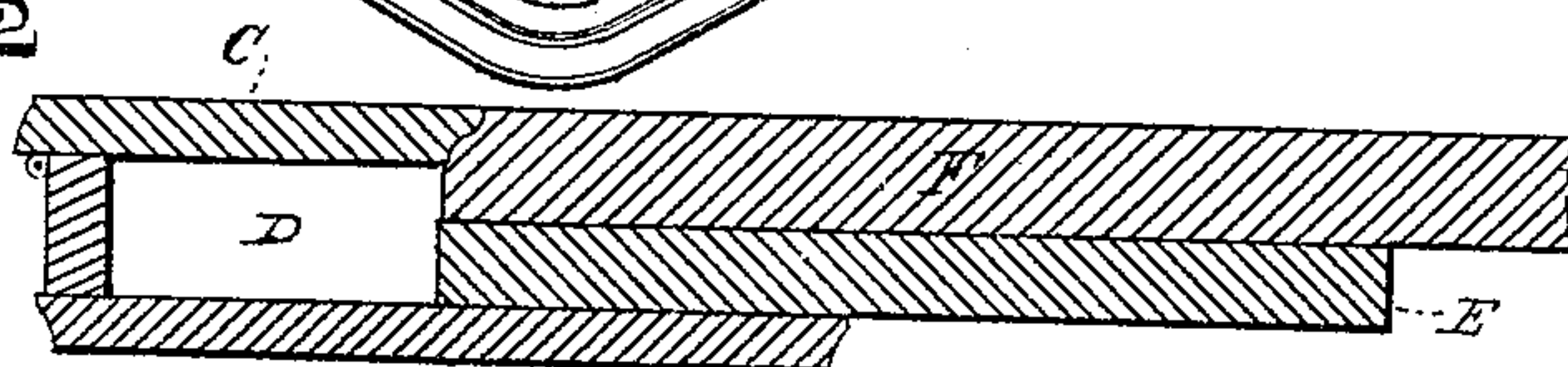

IMPROVEMENT IN SEWING-MACHINE TABLES.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 133,075, dated November 19, 1872.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM H. ALRICH, of the city of Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, have invented certain Improvements in Sewing-Machine Tables, of which the following is a specification:

My invention relates to the combination, with the top of a sewing-machine table, of a case of trays or drawers, provided with a till or connecting flange, as hereinafter described.

Figure 1 is an isometrical view of the tray-stand. Fig. 2 is a cross-section of a portion of the top F of a sewing-machine table, and of the till D, the latter being provided with a flange, E, for connecting it with the table-top.

Like letters in both figures indicate the same parts.

A is a case, and B B B B a series of swinging drawers in combination therewith, constructed as represented in my patent dated

May 28, 1872. D is the till on the top of the case, provided with a hinged lid, C. E is a flange, which is fastened by means of screws to the lower side of the top F of a sewing-machine table-top, as represented in Fig. 2. The front edge of the top is flush with the rear side of the till, making a finish therewith. The top of the till is on the same plane as that of the table-top, forming an extension of the same.

I claim as my invention—

The combination, with the top of a sewing-machine, of the case A, provided with a till, D, and flange E, substantially in the manner and for the purpose set forth.
