

IMPROVEMENT IN SHELVES FOR SALOON-TABLES.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 133,471, dated November 26, 1872.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, John R. McRae, of Vicksburg, in the county of Warren and State of Mississippi, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Shelf for Saloon-Tables, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying drawing and the letters of reference marked thereon making part of this specification.

My invention has relation to saloon-tables; and the novelty consists in the novel construction and arrangement of the swinging shelves pivoted under the table-leaf, whereby a suitable and convenient stand is obtained for drinking-glasses, where they will not be liable to soil the table-top, substantially as hereinafter more fully set forth.

In the accompanying drawing, Figure 1 is a side elevation of my improved saloon-table, showing the shelves extended, and also showing them turned back in under the table where they are entirely out of the way. Fig. 2 is a plan of the same.

Similar letters of reference indicate corresponding parts.

A are the bars which support the top of the

table B; C, the legs; D, the shelves, pivoted at E by screws F to bars A. These shelves may be of any desired shape; but I prefer to have the corners rounded, as shown in the drawing. They may also be dished, as shown at G, into which the glasses may be placed to guard against the possibility of their being pushed off.

The shelves D, when in use, are swung out and around the legs of the table, when the projections H fit into and rest upon the inside of staples I driven into the bars A, which somewhat reduces the strain upon screws F.

Having thus fully described my invention, what I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

In combination with a saloon-table, the movable shelf D, pivoted at one side of the tableleg, and indented on its inner edge to embrace such leg, together with the arms H extending on each side of the leg to form braces, substantially as specified.
