


## IMPROVEMENT IN METALLIC SWEAT AND COLLAR PADS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 138,990, dated May 20, 1873; application filed August 14, 1872.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, John M. C. Bennett, of Ovid, in the county of Clinton and State of Michigan, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Metallic Sweat and Collar Pads; and I do declare that the following is a true and accurate description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawing and to the letters of reference marked thereon, and being a part of this specification, in which—

Figure 1 is a perspective view of my improvement detached. Fig. 2 shows the same in relation to the collar.

Like letters refer to like parts in each figure. The nature of this invention relates to an improvement in sweat and collar pads, so constructed of sheet metal (zinc preferred) as to be flexible to fit the various different conformations in the necks of horses, to entirely prevent chafing, and, when in operation, to create a current of electricity, which will be healing in its tendency. The invention consists in constructing said pad or shield in such form, from sheet metal, that it will readily conform to the shape of the neck and shoulder.

In the accompanying drawing, A represents a collar-pad to be worn between a collar, B, and the neck of the animal.

This pad is stamped or otherwise formed from sheet metal, a decided preference being given to sheet-zinc, and it is interposed between the neck and shoulder of the animal and the collar, where it is held in place by the spring of the collar; and, being smooth, prevents any sweat or moisture from the animal coming into contact with the collar; and, at the same time, presents a firm foundation, against which the draft is brought, and prevents chafing.

What I claim as my invention, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The adjustable collar cap and shield A, made distinct and separate from the collar, and adapted to be applied between any ordinary collar and the neck of a horse, as and for the purpose set forth.
