


IMPROVEMENT IN COTTON-BALE TIES.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 149,144, dated March 31, 1874; application filed November 17, 1873.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, AARON J. NELLIS, of Pittsburg, in the county of Allegheny and State of Pennsylvania, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Bale-Tie; and I do hereby declare the following to be a full, clear, and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawing forming a part of this specification, in which—

Figure 1 is a perspective view of my improved bale-tie, illustrating the method of applying and using the same. Fig. 2 is a view of the buckle.

To enable others skilled in the art to make and use my improvement, I will describe its construction and manner of use.

I make a solid buckle, a, having two openings or slots, a^1 and a^2 . I pass the end of the strap b through the slot a^2 , and fold it back and secure it to the strap by means of a rivet, c. On the rivet c I attach the hook d, which extends across the slot a^1 . The strap b is bent around the bale, in the usual way, and a loop, e, is formed at its other end. This loop is pressed through the slot a^1 , and the hook passed through it, as shown. I have then a perfect tie, simple in its construction, and easy

of application and use. The friction against the end of the tie-opening a^1 and upon the hook d is so great that it is impossible to pull the strap out of the tie-opening a^1 .

Instead of two openings a^1 and a^2 in the buckle a, the opening a^1 may be made a little wider, and the rear end of the strap secured in it instead of in the opening a^2 .

The hook being attached to the strap, as shown, or to the buckle itself, in any convenient way, is not liable to become lost.

The strap b may be looped, as at e, at any desired point, so that when the bale is compressed it may be taken up to suit the reduced size of the bale.

What I claim as my invention, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

The combination of the bale-band, having one end looped and the hook C riveted thereto, with the closed buckle a, substantially as specified.
