


MPROVEMENT IN HAND-STAMPS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 152,333, dated June 23, 1874; application filed June 8, 1874.

To all whom it may concern:

Beitknown that I, EDMUND D. CHAMBER-LAIN, of Westfield, New Jersey, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Hand-Stamps for Printing, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying drawings making a part of this specification, in which-

Figure 1 is a perspective view of my improvement. Fig. 2 is a vertical section of

same. Fig. 3 is an end view.

My invention relates to that class of handrollers used for printing names on packages; and consists in the combination of parts hereinafter explained.

To enable others skilled in the art to make and use my invention, I will proceed to describe the manner in which I have carried it aut.

In the drawings, the ink-roller B, revolving on the shaft b, which has its bearings in the ends of the shell or cover A, is pressed upon the die by the spring C, secured in the upper and inner side of the cover. The ends of the spring are slotted, and fit over the shaft b, |

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which has a play in its slotted bearings in the end of the cover, as shown in Fig. 3. This cover or shell, holding the ink-roller, is held upon the die or printing-roller by means of the spring-arms d and pin e, as shown in Fig. 2 D is a printing-roller, consisting of a rubber band stretched over a drum-wheel, and having upon it the requisite letters for printing. The shaft f of the printing-roller is provided with the stop g to check and control its revolution.

I am aware that hand-rollers for printing are not new, and therefore I do not claim. broadly, the printing-roller described; but

What I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is-

The ink-roller B, spring C, and cover A, in combination with the printing-roller D. substantially as and for the purpose set forth.
