

IMPROVEMENT IN MONUMENTS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 169,751, dated November 9, 1875; application filed September 17, 1875.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that we, John N. Wallis, of Fleming, in the county of Cayuga and State of New York, and Theodore Wallis, of Scipio, in the county of Cayuga and State of New York, have invented a new and Improved Monument, of which the following is a specification:

Our invention consists of a novel construction of memorial monuments, of stone and glass, to make finer and more ornamental structures, and also to provide inclosed chambers for the preservation of flowers and other objects.

Figure 1 is an elevation of our improved monument. Fig. 2 is a section on line x x, and Fig. 3 is a section on line y y.

Similar letters of reference indicate corresponding parts.

A B represents a base of blue granite or other enduring stone, on which are four corner-posts, C, of the same or any other stone, said posts being grooved to receive glass panels D, which are also connected at top and bottom with cross-pieces E. These posts also

support a cap, F, of granite, on which is a hollow shaft of thick strong glass, G, which is surmounted by a cap, H, that may be taken off to open the shaft for putting in flowers, names, &c., and on the top of the cap is an ornamental sphere, I, of glass or other approved material.

The panels D may be made of mirrors, if preferred, and the ball I may be a reflector, variegated glass, or other ornamental object.

Having thus described our invention, we claim as new and desire to secure by Letters Patent—

A monument consisting of the stone base A B, posts C, glass panels D, connected by cross-pieces E, cap F, glass shaft G, detachable cap H, and ball I, as shown and described.
