

IMPROVEMENT IN SKIRT-PROTECTORS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. 176,020, dated April 11, 1876; application filed March 4, 1876.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Albert Lyons, of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented a new and Improved Skirt-Protector and Trimming, of which the following is a specification:

Figure 1 is a front view of my improved skirt-protector and trimming; and Fig. 2 is a cross-section of the same, taken through line x x, Fig 1.

Similar letters of reference indicate corresponding parts.

The object of this invention is to furnish an improved skirt protector, which shall be so made as to serve also as a trimming for the skirt.

The invention will first be described in connection with the drawing, and then pointed out in the claim.

A is the inner part or ply of the protector, which is made of rubber, leather, oiled cloth, or other suitable material, upon the lower edge of which is formed a hem, to receive the stiffening cord when used. B is the strip of embossed, stamped, embroidered, printed, or

other fancy cloth, which should be of a color, texture, and style to correspond with the skirt to which it is to be applied. The lower edge of the strip B is sewed to the strip A at the upper part of its hem. The upper edges of the strips A B are secured to each other by the binding C, by means of which it is secured to the skirt. By this construction a neat and serviceable skirt-protector is produced, which serves at the same time as a trimming for the skirt.

Having thus described my invention, I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters Patent—

A compound skirt-protector and trimming, formed of the ply-strip A and ornamental strip B, connected by binding C near the upper end, and the trimming sewed at its lower edge to the upper part of the hem of ply-strip, as and for the purpose specified.
