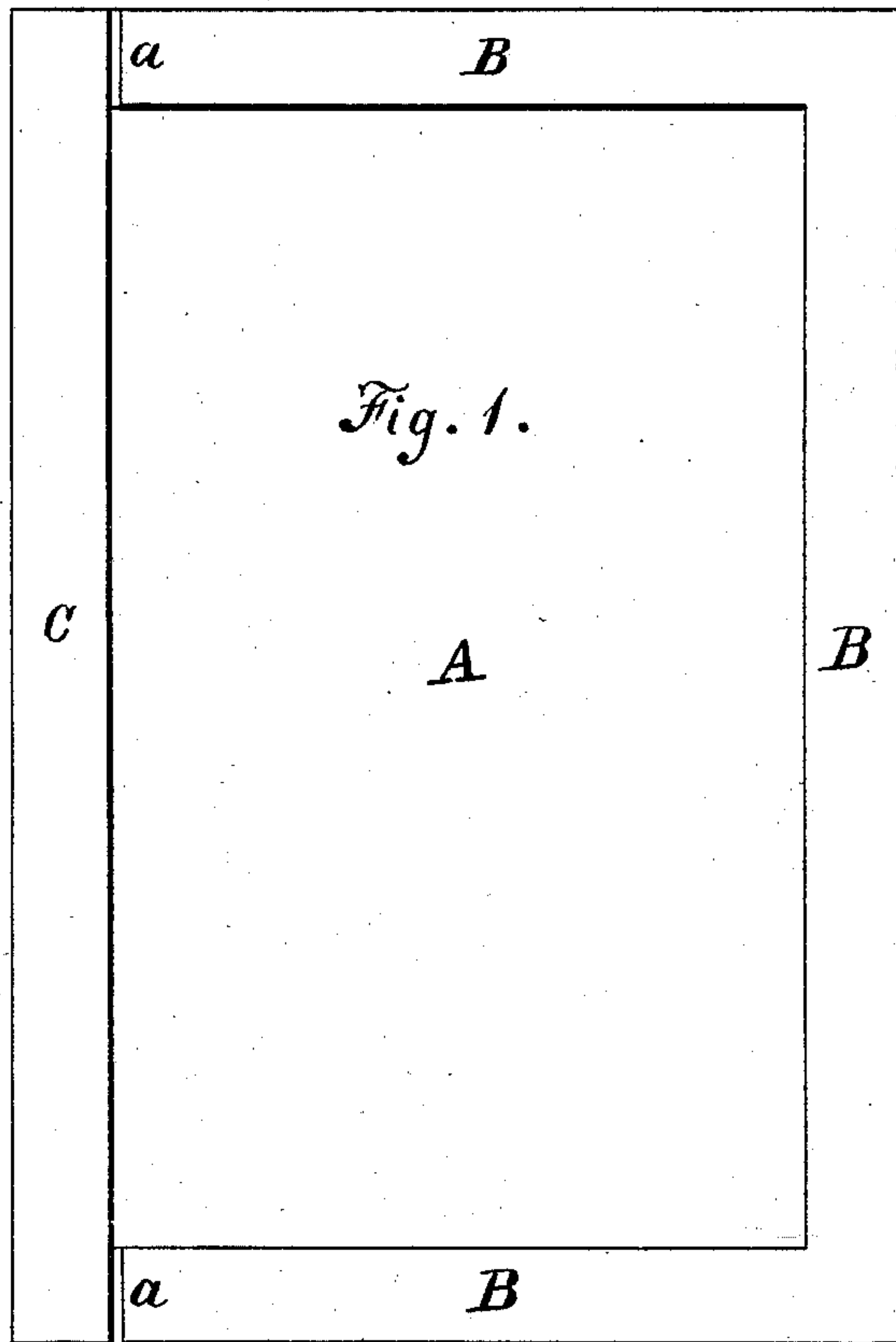

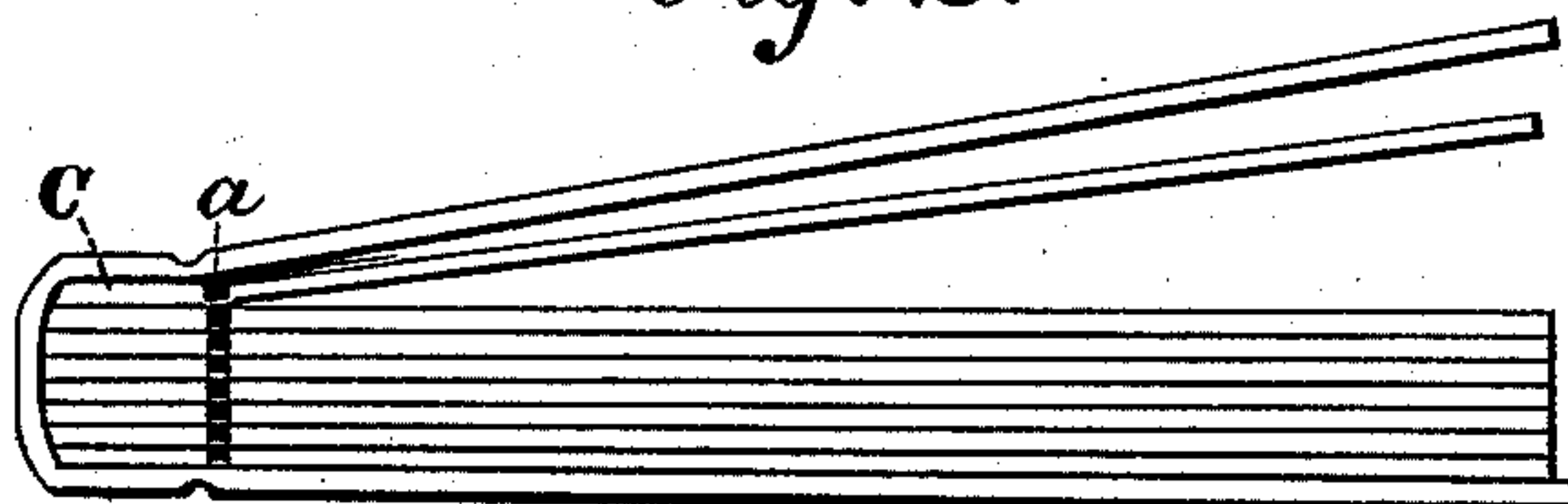

IMPROVEMENT IN BOOKS.

Specification forming part of Letters Patent No. **203,410**, dated May 7, 1878; application filed March 6, 1876.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JOHN J. BRUNOR, of the city of Washington, in the District of Columbia, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Books for containing between their leaves maps, charts, or specimens, which improvement relates to the leaves thereof, and is fully set forth in the following specification, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, in which—

Figure 1 is a plan view of my improved leaf detached, and Fig. 2 is an end view of a book provided with my improved leaf. Fig. 3 represents an end view of a detached leaf.

The object of my invention is to form a compact edge to books containing charts, maps, herbaceous, entomologic, or other collections, scraps, and samples.

My improved leaf consists of the sunken panel A, having a raised border, B, with incision *a* between the side border C and the ends of the border B. The portion C of the border is attached to the other leaves of the book in the process of binding it, and the in-

cisions *a* serve as hinges, by means of which the leaf can be readily turned, like the ordinary book-leaf. The sunken or panel portion A serves as a recess for the reception of maps, charts, or specimens, and the border protects the same, and makes the book compact in form.

The border may be made, and is preferably made, in one piece, with incisions *a*, as represented, with a piece of paper or its equivalent pasted to it to form the panel.

I claim as new—

The leaf herein described, consisting of the panel A and the border or frame B C, provided with the incisions *a a* inside of the part C to form hinges, substantially as and for the purpose set forth.
