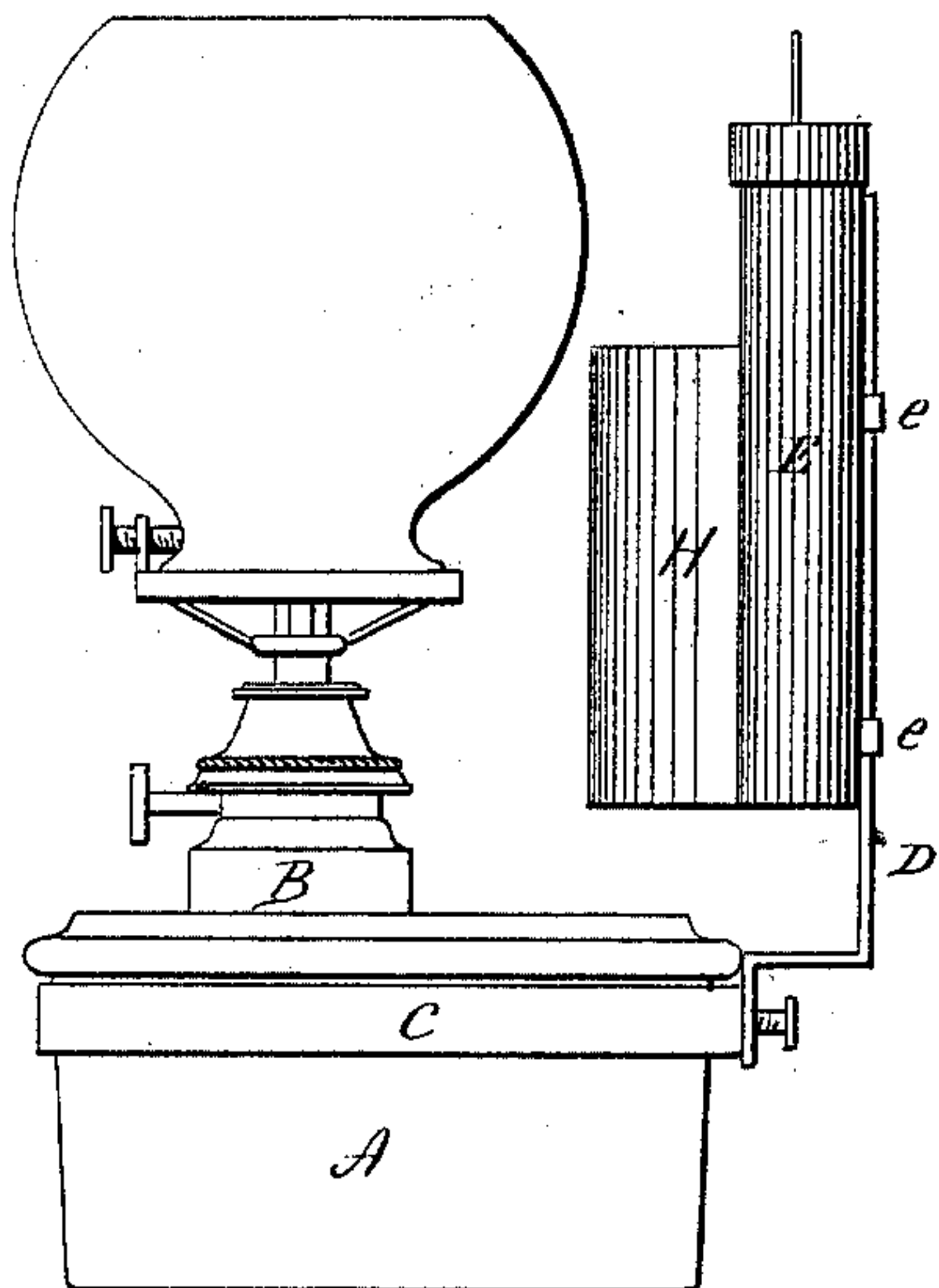

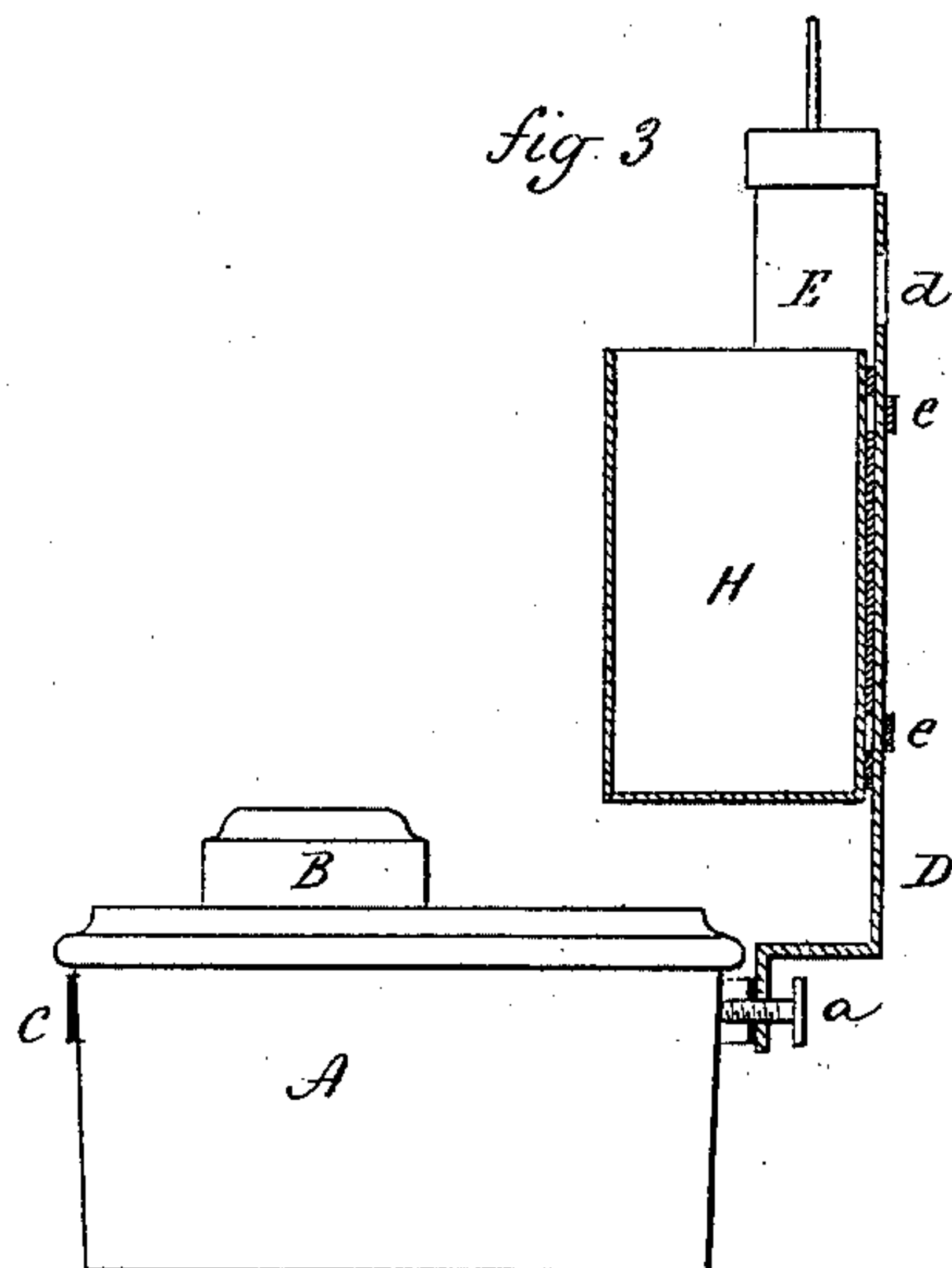

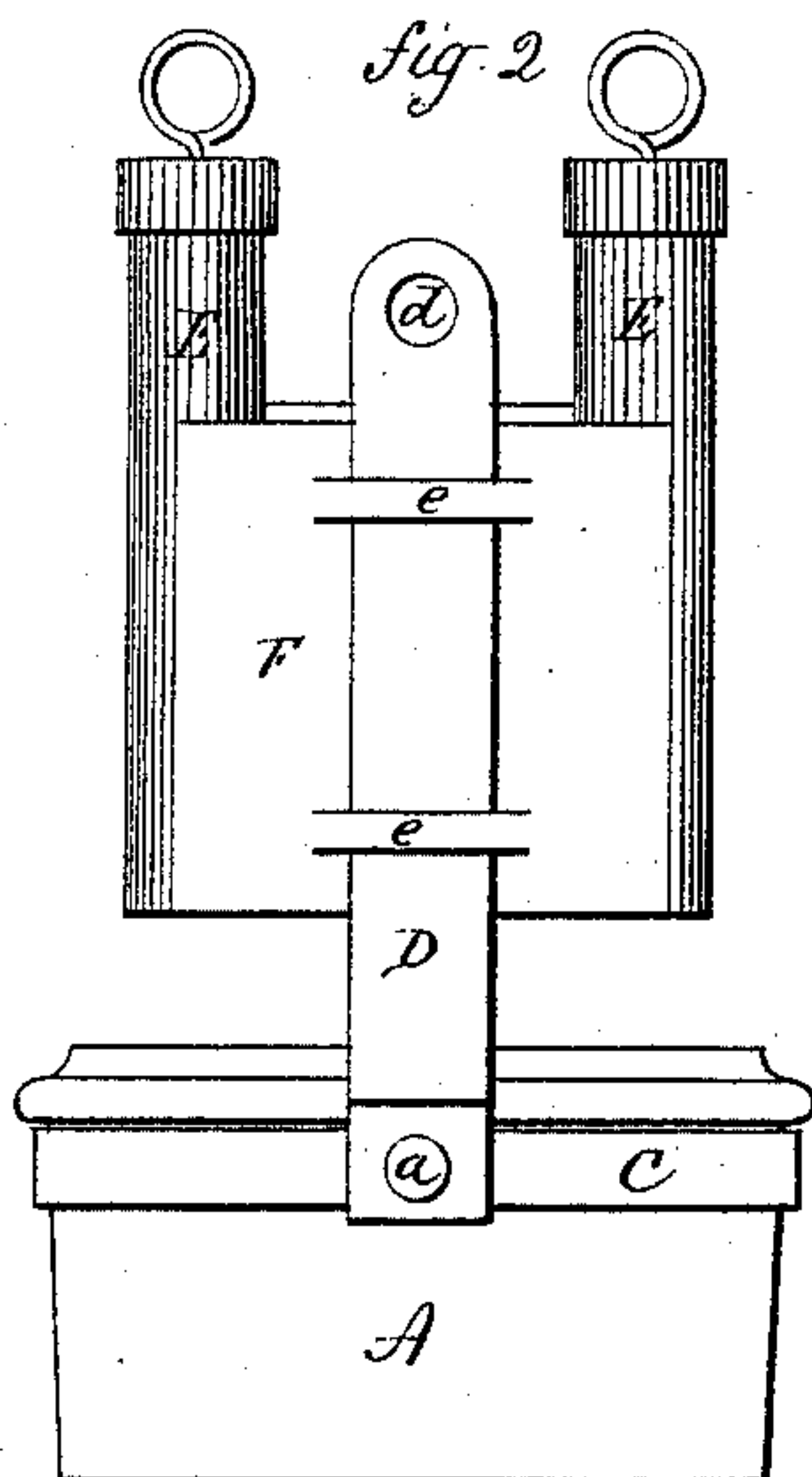
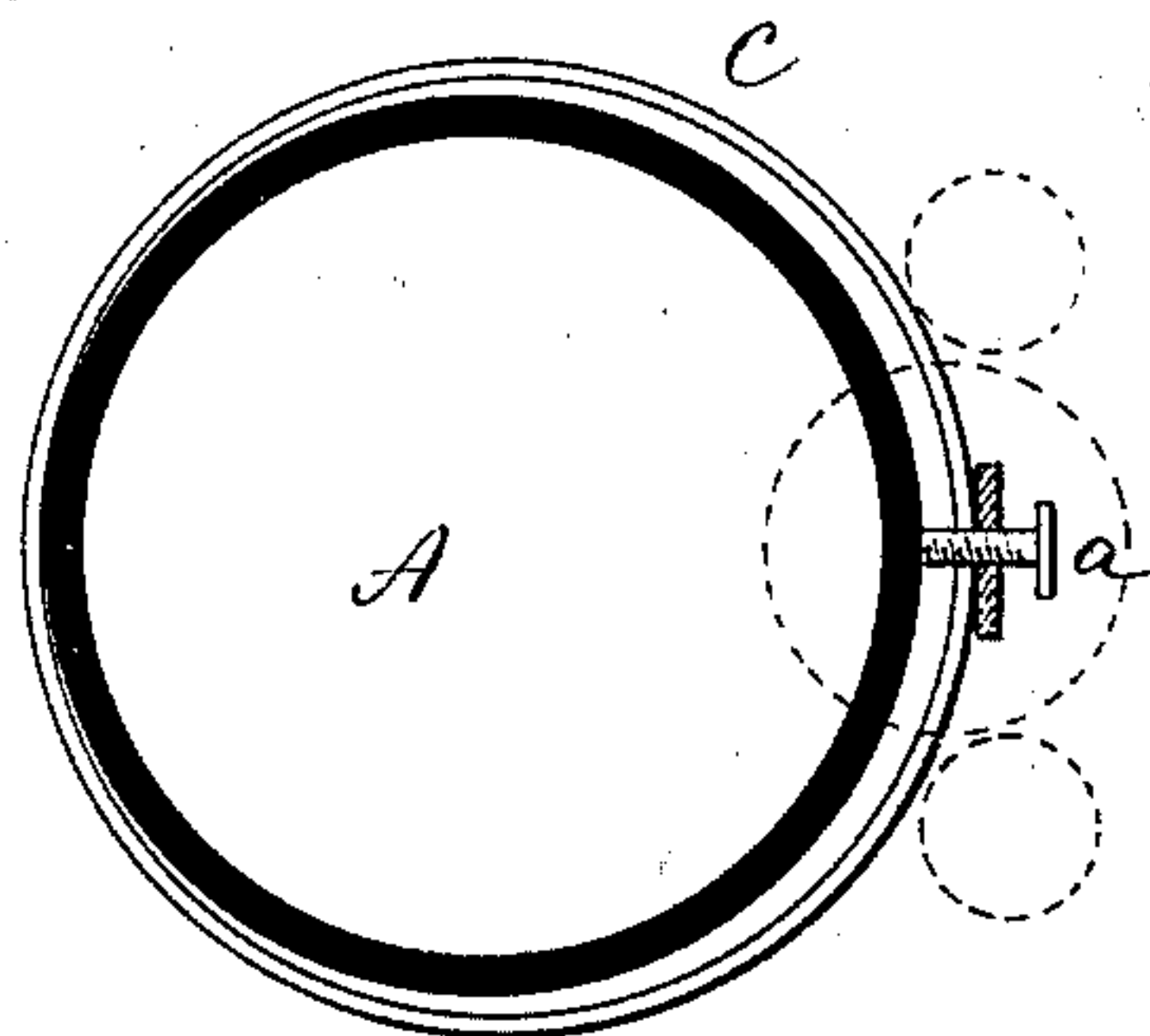

## CIGAR-LIGHT.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 223,704, dated January 20, 1880.

Application filed August 26, 1879.

*To all whom it may concern :*

Be it known that I, EDSON L. BRYANT, of Ansonia, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new  
5 Improvement in Cigar-Lights; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings and the letters of reference marked thereon, to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same,  
10 and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent, in—

Figure 1, a side view; Fig. 2, a rear view; Fig. 3, a vertical section, and Fig. 4 a transverse section of the fount of the lamp.

15 This invention relates to an improvement in that class of cigar-lights in which alcohol-founts with dips are combined with a lamp; and the invention consists in the construction, as hereinafter described, and particularly re-  
20 cited in the claim.

A is the fount, of glass or other suitable material, arranged to receive the collar B and the burner, in the usual manner for kerosene or other burners. C is a band around the  
25 fount, fitting it loosely, but provided with a set-screw, *a*, by which it may be bound or clamped to the fount so as to hold firmly

thereon. From the band C is an upright, D, terminating at its upper end with a perforation, *d*, or other convenient device, by which  
30 the lamp may be hung to the wall, if desired.

E E are two tubes or founts for alcohol, attached to a plate, F, and this plate is provided with loops *e* to set on over the upright D, and so as to support the dips at any desired eleva-  
35 tion on the upright, it being easily raised up and down thereon or removed altogether. Between the dips is a receiver, H, which may be used for matches or dry lighters. This construction makes an exceedingly cheap and  
40 convenient lighter, adapted to rest on the counter or be hung upon the wall, as may be desired.

I claim—

The combination of the lamp-fount and the  
45 burner with the clamping-band C, upright D, alcohol-founts E, and receiver H, provided with loops *e*, for attaching said founts and receiver to the said upright, substantially as described.
