## SALVE.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 229,937, dated July 13, 1880.

Application filed May 3, 1880. (No specimens.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, CHARLOTTE G. ANNAN, of the city of Brooklyn, in the county of Kings and State of New York, have invented a new and useful Compound, which compound is fully described in the following specification.

This invention relates to that class of compounds used as salves for bodily hurts, boils, felons, carbuncles, and inflammations; and it consists in a composition formed by mixing the following ingredients, viz: one pound of pulverized rosin, one ounce of pulverized sulphur, one ounce pulverized sassafras, one-half ounce pulverized spikenard, one-half ounce of pulverized opium, one tea-spoonful pulverized camphor-gum, four ounces of tar, one and a half ounce of beeswax, cut fine, or in somewhat similar proportions.

To prepare the salve, put the rosin and bees-20 wax over a slow fire in an iron or other pan.

When melted well add the spikenard, sulphur, opium, camphor-gum, and sassafras, boil slowly for five minutes, remove from the fire, pour in the tar, stirring very slowly all the time until the compound is well mixed, when 25 it is ready for use.

I claim—

The medical compound or salve herein described, consisting of pulverized rosin, pulverized sulphur, pulverized sassafras, pulverized 30 spikenard, pulverized opium, pulverized camphor-gum, tar, and beeswax, substantially in the proportions and mixed in the manner above stated.
