

## CIGAR-LIGHTER LAMP.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 232,058, dated September 7, 1880.

Application filed July 2, 1880. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, ALBERT PATITZ, of West Meriden, in the county of New Haven and State of Connecticut, have invented a new 5 Improvement in Cigar-Lighter Lamps; and I do hereby declare the following, when taken in connection with the accompanying drawings and the letters of reference marked thereon, to be a full, clear, and exact description of ro the same, and which said drawings constitute part of this specification, and represent, in-

Figure 1, a sectional front view; Fig. 2, a top view of the bracket-arms.

This invention relates to an improvement in 15 the construction of that class of cigar-lighter lamps which are provided with alcohol-fount or taper-receiver at each side the body of the lamp; and the invention consists in the construction as hereinafter described, and par-

20 ticularly recited in the claim. A represents the lower part of the base, and B the upper part, with a division between to receive the bracket D. The lamp-fount C is arranged upon the upper section. D is the 25 lighter-receiver bracket, which is constructed with an opening, d, through its center, so as

to set onto the shoulder a of the lower part of the base and to receive the lower end, b, of

the upper part.

From the fount a bolt, E, extends down 30 through the two parts of the base and the bracket-arms, and provided with a nut, e, at the bottom, so that the parts are bound together, the upper and lower part of the base grasping the bracket-arms between them, so 35 as to hold them firmly. Each of the arms D is provided with the lighter-receivers F.

This invention simplifies the construction of the lamp, and makes the connection between the lighter-receiver and the base very light 40 and tasteful, at the same time very firm and

strong.

I claim— A cigar-lighter lamp having the bracketarms D, arranged and supported between the 45 two sections of the base, and means, substantially such as specified, for securing the parts together, all substantially as described.
