

STRETCHER FOR CARPET-CLEANERS.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 235,848, dated December 28, 1880,

Application filed May 4, 1880. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that we, WILLIAM BIXBY, of | Syracuse, in the county of Onondaga, and ASA BROOKS, of Binghamton, in the county 5 of Broome, and State of New York, have invented a new and valuable Improvement in Stretchers for Carpet - Cleaners; and we do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description of the construcro tion and operation of the same, reference being had to the annexed drawing, making a part of this specification, and to the letters and figures of reference marked thereon.

The drawing is a representation of a per-

15 spective view of my improved machine.

This invention has relation to improvements in mechanisms for stretching carpets and other fabrics, so that the dust may be readily beaten out of the same and they may 20 be readily cleaned and dried.

The nature of the invention consists in certain novel combinations of devices used, as hereinafter fully shown and described.

In the annexed drawings, the letter A des-25 ignates clamps composed each of a grooved bar, a, and a tongued bar, b, between which the ends of the carpet or other fabric are placed. These clamps are considerably longer than the width of the fabric to be cleaned, and the bars 30 a b are thrust together, thus griping the carpet between by means of set-screws or other suitable devices.

C indicates standards of suitable length, having on their upper ends the loops c, formed 35 of metal, and of a size to fit snugly over the ends of the clamps, as shown in the drawing. These standards support the clamps and raise them to a sufficient height from the ground to prevent the fabric from sagging into contact

40 therewith.

The grooved bar a is provided on its edge with strong metallic eyes c', arranged at suitable distances apart, for engagement with hooks d, upon the ends of guy or stay ropes D. These 45 are usually provided with rings r upon their remaining ends.

The device is set up in a room or on the ground by first placing one of the clamps in an upright position, and staying or guying it 50 by means of the ropes D, which are secured to the ground or floor by means of pins e, passing through the rings r. The fabric |

griped by the clamps is then stretched out to its full length, the remaining clamp A set upright and, the fabric being stretched as much 55 as possible, guyed or stayed by means of similar ropes and pins D'e'. This preliminary stretching, which is not usually sufficient to make the fabric tense enough, is supplemented by a second and final stretching 6c by means of a windlass, G, supported by a stand, J, having a broad base, L, secured to the ground or floor by the hook-pins f. This windlass is located in line with the center eyes of the clamps, and the hook h on the 65 end of the winding-rope N is engaged with one of said eyes. The winding-drum is operated by means of a crank, l, and acts upon the clamp to which its rope N is attached to draw it away forcibly from the other clamp, 70 thus stretching the fabric and putting it in proper condition for beating out the dust and for being cleaned and dried.

What we claim as new, and desire to secure

by Letters Patent, is—

1. The carpet-stretching device consisting of the clamps A, designed to hold the ends of the carpet, and composed of the grooved bar a and tongued bar b, the standards C, having loops c, adapted to be passed over the ends of 8c said bars, and the guy-ropes D D', detachably secured to the bars a and pinned to the ground or floor, substantially as specified.

2. In a carpet-stretcher, the combination, with the clamps A, consisting of the tongue- 85. bar b and grooved bar a, the standards C, having end loops, c, passing onto the ends of said bars, and the detachable guys D D', of the windlass G and winding-rope N, substantially

as specified.

3. The combination, with the grooved bar a and the tongued bar b, clamped together on the carpet ends, of the standards C, having end loops, c, passing over the ends of said bars and holding them together, substantially as 95 specified.
