

TOY PAIL.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 238,479, dated March 8, 1881.

Application filed May 13, 1880. (Model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EDWARD ALDOM, of the city of Brooklyn, county of Kings, and State of New York, have invented a certain new and useful Improvement in Toy-Molding Apparatus, of which the following is a specification.

My invention relates to improvements in that class of toy pails used extensively at the seashore resorts during the summer season.

The object of my invention is to instruct and amuse children, while playing in the sand with pail and shovel, by molding or forming letters, medallions, and other figures on or in the forms made.

Figure 1 is a perspective view, the side partly cut away. Fig. 2 is a view of the bottom of the pail. Fig. 3 is a top view of one of the forms molded in the pail when turned out, showing the letters and other figures impressed in or on the sand or other substances used.

I construct my pails in the usual form of toy pails, as shown at Fig. 1. I make them of wood, papier-maché, metal, or other suitable 25 material. I attach to the bottom of the pail, inside, the letters and figures to be impressed on the sand or other substances to be molded, as shown at A, Fig. 2. The letters and figures to be impressed on the sand or other substance can be impressed, stamped, or molded

in the bottom, and form a part of the bottom of the pail, as shown at Fig. 2.

A separate piece can be used in the bottom of the pail, with the figures and letters either stamped or cast on it, with either raised or depressed letters and figures. This piece being loose, any number of such pieces can be used in the same pail, each piece having a different design on it.

To use my invention, place in the pail 40 the sand or other substance to be molded or formed, and press it down so as to make it compact, then turn the pail upside down, and deposit the contents in a molded form in any convenient place. The figures and letters will 45 be clearly seen on the molded form, as shown in Fig. 3.

What I claim as my invention, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

As a new article of manufacture, a toy-mold-50 ing apparatus, consisting of a pail with figures or letters attached to or impressed in the bottom, forming a part of the bottom, and adapted to make impressions in sand, substantially as and for the purpose set forth.
