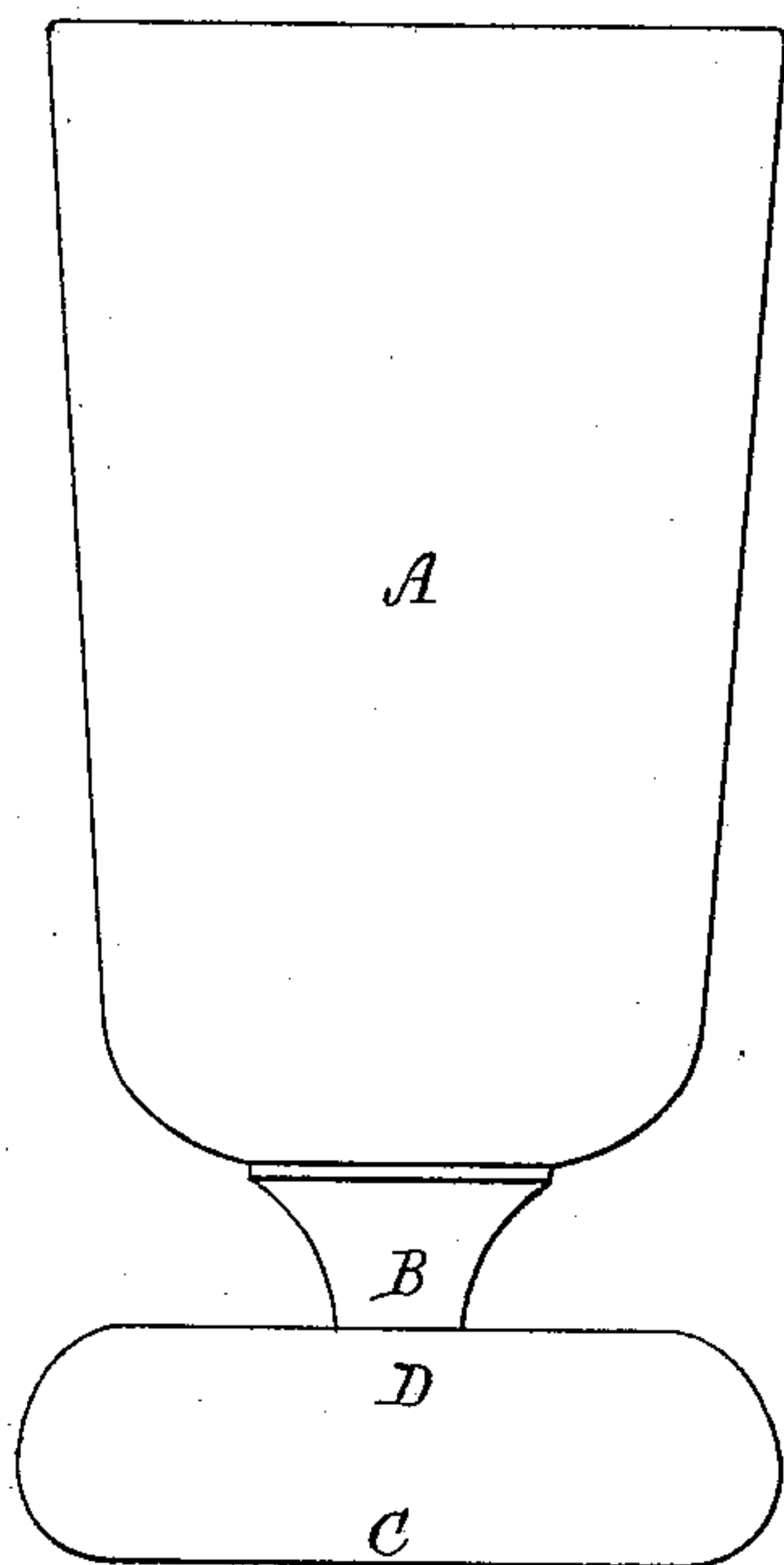

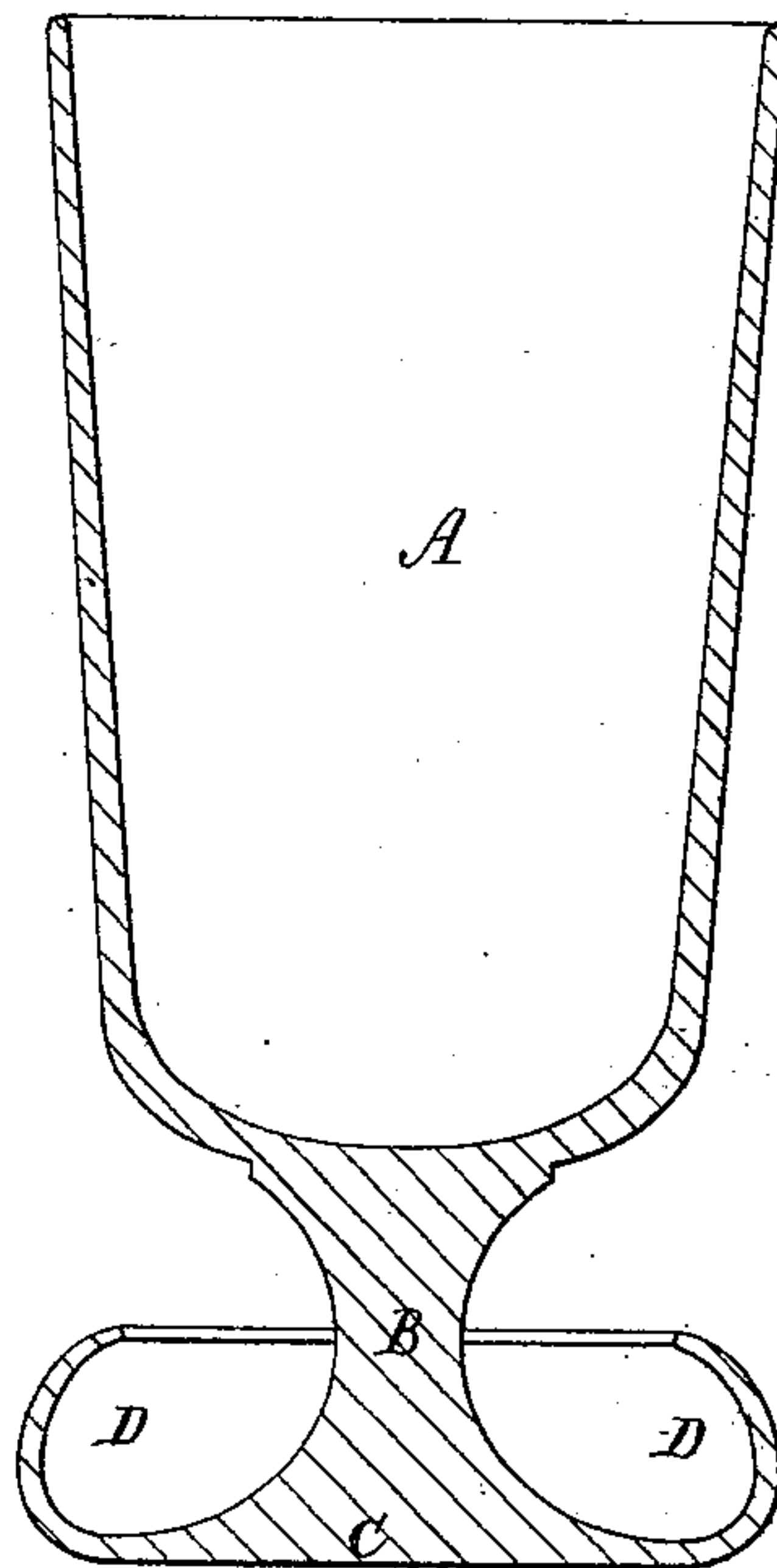
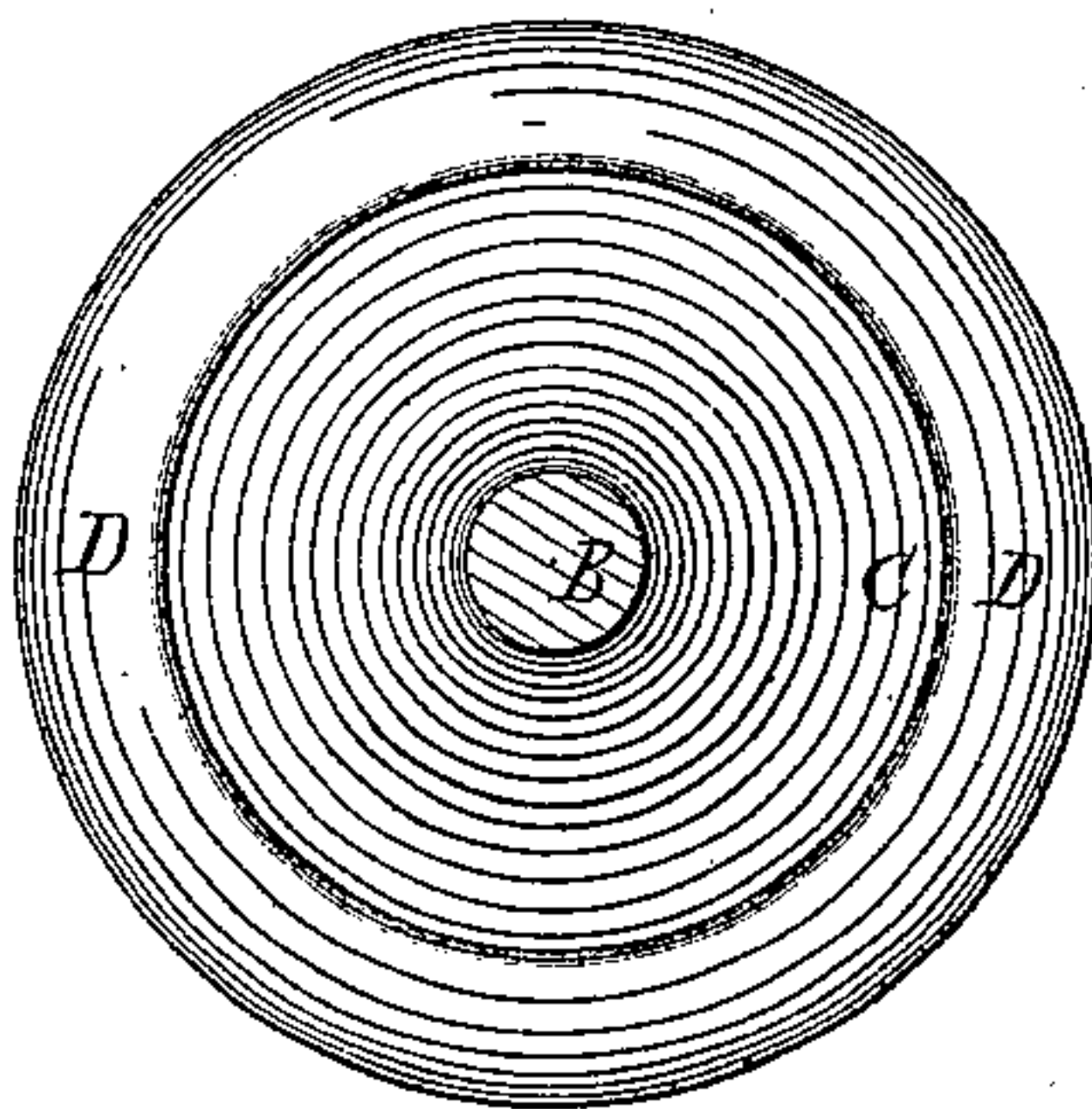

DRINKING CUP OR GLASS.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 248,867, dated November 1, 1881.

Application filed September 19, 1881. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, GEORGE H. LOMAX, of Somerville, of the county of Middlesex and State of Massachusetts, have invented a new and useful Improvement in Drinking Cups or Glasses; and I do hereby declare the same to be described in the following specification, and represented in the accompanying drawings, of which—

10 Figure 1 is a side elevation, and Fig. 2 a vertical and transverse section, of a goblet or drinking-glass provided with my invention. Fig. 3 is a horizontal section taken through its shank.

15 Beer tumblers or goblets as usually made are liable on being filled or drunk from to have the froth or more or less of the beverage run down upon their external surfaces, and fall therefrom or from their feet upon a person or table, and besides the feet are very liable to become broken away more or less at their edges.

25 To prevent such is the object of my invention, which consists in providing the foot of the drinking-vessel with a troughed lip to extend upward from it at and around its periph-

ery, and to curve inward toward the shank, all being substantially as shown in the accompanying drawings, in which—

A denotes the body of a drinking cup or goblet; B, its shank, and C its foot, while D is the troughed lip, which is in one piece with and projects upward from the shank, and curves inward toward such shank, in manner as represented. 35

This troughed lip, besides serving to strengthen the foot and prevent it from being easily broken, as described, forms around the shank a receiver to intercept the drippings or liquid that may flow down on the outer surface of the glass, and it also prevents such liquid from dripping off the foot while the glass may be turned up for being drunk from. 40

What I claim as my invention, and as a new or improved article of manufacture, is— 45

A drinking-cup or glass goblet having to its foot and about the shank thereof a trough-shaped lip, as and for the purpose as specified.
