

HORSE-COLLAR.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 260,827, dated July 11, 1882.

Application filed April 22, 1882. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JACOB NICHOLAS BICK-EL, of Terre Haute, in the county of Vigo and State of Indiana, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Horse Collars; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description of the invention, which will enable others skilled in the art to which it appertains to make and use the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, which form a part of this specification.

Figure 1 is a perspective view, and Fig. 2 is a horizontal sectional view.

Like letters of reference in both figures refer to the corresponding parts.

This invention relates to horse-collars of that class which are provided with means for retaining the hames in position; and it consists in providing the neck-roll, which is located at right angles to the shoulder-pad, with a continuous row of stitching, forming a welt directly in front of the shoulder-pad, said welt being provided with a wire filling or stiffener, as will be hereinafter more fully described, and particularly pointed out in the claim.

In the drawings hereto annexed, A represents the shoulder-cushion, and B the neckroll, of my improved horse-collar, which may be manufactured of leather in any suitable well-known manner. The outer edge of the neck-roll B, which may be described as being located in front of and at right angles to the shoulder-cushion A, is provided with a seam, 35 C, extending entirely around the same and forming a welt, D, directly in front of and parallel to the shoulder-cushion A, and in which

is placed a wire or rod, E, extending entirely around the neck-roll and forming a stiffener, which absolutely prevents the displacement of 40 the welt D. The welt D forms a guard to hold the hames securely in place and prevent them from slipping off the collar.

This invention is exceedingly simple and effective for the purpose set forth, and it entails 45 but slight additional expense, if any, in the manufacture of horse-collars.

I am aware that it is not new in a horse-collar to provide the neck-roll with an enlargement for the purpose of holding the hames in 50-place.

I am also aware that a horse-collar has been made in which the shoulder-pad, neck-roll, and an intermediate roll have been formed of a single bag properly stuffed and stitched.

Having thus described my invention, I claim and desire to secure by Letters Patent of the United States—

As an improvement in horse-collars, the shoulder-cushion A, having neck-roll B, located 60 in front of and at right angles thereto, and provided with a continuous seam, C, forming a welt, D, in front of and parallel to the shoulder-pad, in combination with the stiffening rod or wire E, arranged in said welt to pre-65 vent its being displaced, as set forth.
