



DOG FOR LOG-CHAINS.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 266,505, dated October 24, 1882.

Application filed August 1, 1882. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Peter Okell, of Fort Madison, in the county of Lee, and in the State of Iowa, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Dogs for Log-Chains; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, and to the letters of reference marked thereon, making a part of this specification.

This invention relates to an improved dog for log-chains; and it has for its objects to provide a movable and adjustable device that may be secured to the chain at any desired point, as more fully hereinafter specified. These objects I attain by the means illustrated in the accompanying drawings, in which—

Figure 1 represents a side elevation, showing my device applied to a portion of a chain; and Fig. 2, a sectional view on the line x x of Fig. 1.

The letter A indicates the dog, which is constructed in two parts, a b, having the usual chiseledges, c, in order to bite into the log and hold the chain thereto. The contiguous faces

of the two parts are provided with semicircular grooves or recesses d, as indicated.

The dog is attached to a link of a chain at any desired point of the chain by clasping the link B between the parts, the sides of the link 30 sitting in the recesses or grooves before mentioned. The parts are secured together upon the link by screws e or other suitable devices.

Having thus described my invention, what I claim, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, 35 is—

A dog for log chains, constructed in two parts, with adjoining recesses or grooves, in which a chain-link is adapted to fit, the parts being provided with suitable chisel-edges, and 40 with screw or other fastening devices, whereby the parts are secured together, substantially as shown and described.
