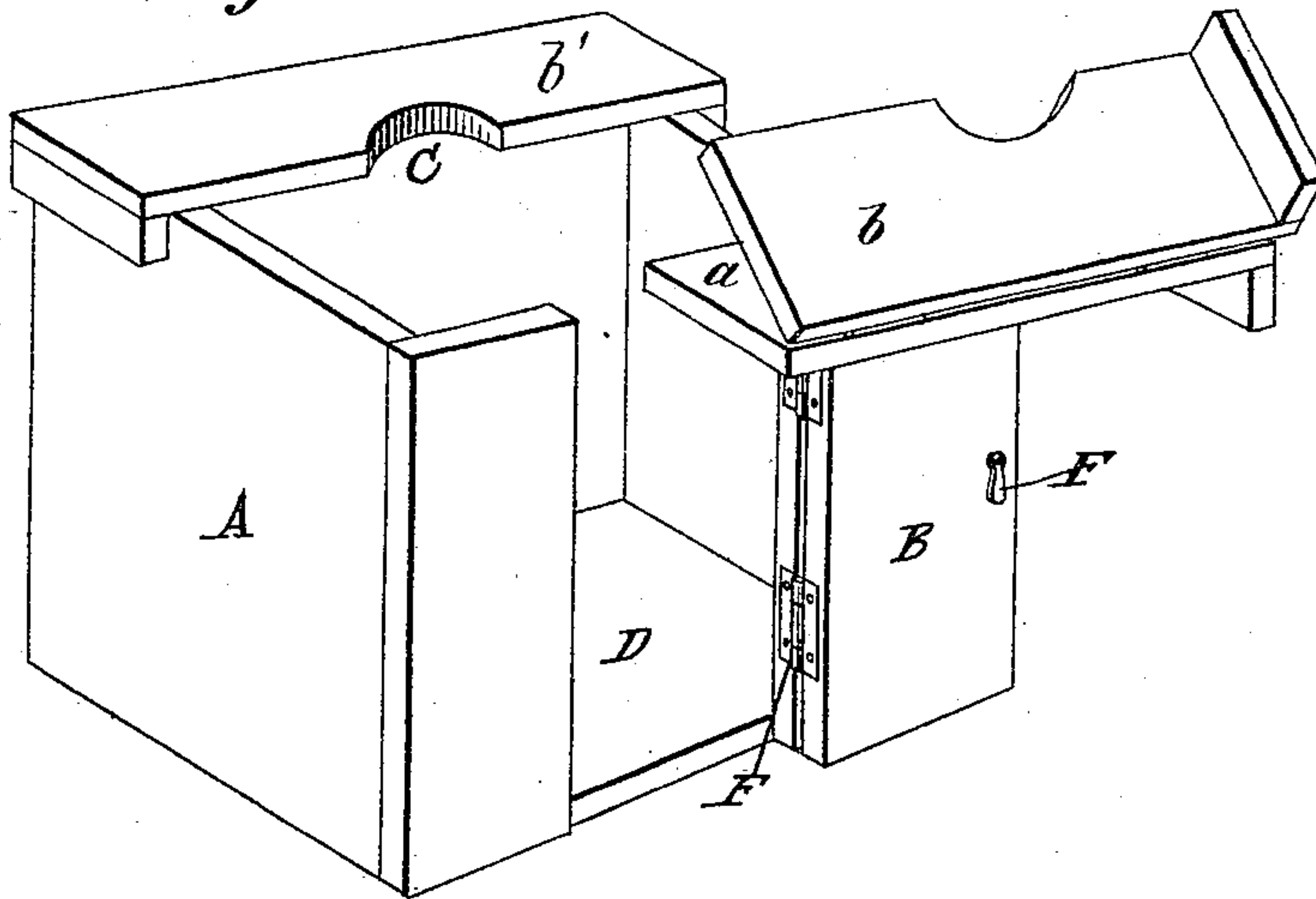
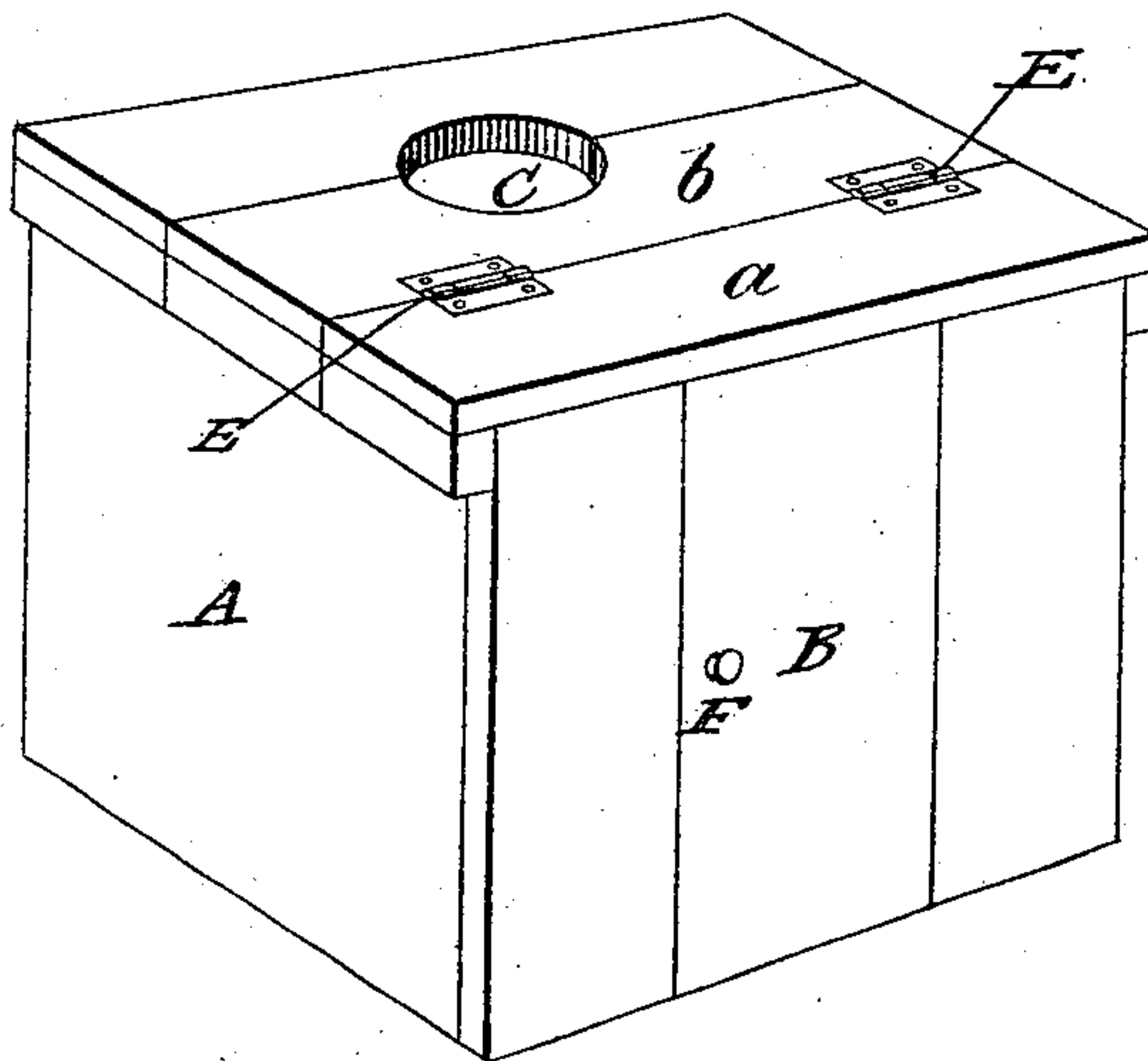

CABINET STEAM-BATH.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 270,564, dated January 9, 1883.

Application filed August 12, 1882. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, BONHAM GALLAND, a citizen of the United States, residing at Gold Hill, in the county of Storey and State of Nevada, have invented a new and useful Cabinet Steam-Bath, of which the following is a specification.

My invention relates to improvements in cabinet vapor or steam baths in which a portion of the cover is attached to and moves with the door; and the object of my improvements is to obtain a bathing apparatus which is of simple construction.

In the accompanying drawings, which fully illustrate my invention, Figure 1 represents a perspective view of the bath, the door being open to show the interior. Fig. 2 represents a perspective view of the bath.

Similar letters refer to corresponding parts. A represents the casing of the bath, having a door, B, to whose upper end is fastened the projection *a* of the section *b*. The cover is composed of three sections, *a*, *b*, and *b'*, the latter being rigidly affixed to the casing, and the sections *a b* being joined by hinges E, which permit of raising the section *b*. To the door B is attached the locking-bolt F. The sections *b b'* are hollowed in the middle, so as to form a circular aperture when the sections come together, permitting the obtrusion of the bather's head. Sometimes I line two contiguous interior sides with zinc, to retain the

heat generated. Although it is not shown upon my drawings nor is essential to the operation of my invention, I find it desirable to place a chair in the bath, having a removable perforated leather seat, so that two or more persons can successively use the bath without having to sit on a seat disagreeably wet.

When I use the bath I place an alcohol-lamp under the seat, whose heat causes the water in a kettle suspended over it to boil, and in the water I place an ounce (more or less) of camomile-blossoms or wild sage, so that the steam generated from the water is charged with agreeable and healthy odors.

What I claim, and desire to secure by Letters Patent of the United States, is—

1. In a cabinet steam-bath, the casing A, having section *b'*, in combination with the door B, having attached thereto sections *a b*, substantially as set forth.

In a cabinet steam-bath, the casing A, having section *b'*, semi-circumferentially hollowed out in the middle, in combination with the door B, having attached thereto sections *a b*, the latter being semi-circumferentially hollowed out, so that when the sections *b b'* join they form a circular neck-aperture, substantially as set forth.
