

ALBUM FOR PHOTOGRAPHS, &c.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 271,765, dated February 6, 1883. Application filed May 15, 1882. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, VIOLA J. AUGIR, a citizen of the United States of America, residing at Spencer, in the county of Clay and State 5 of Iowa, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Albums for Photographs, &c., of which the following is a specification.

My invention relates to improvements in albums, and particularly relates to that class of 10 albums designed to receive photographs in connection with autographs.

In the accompanying drawings, which form a part of this specification, Figure 1 is a perspective view of an album embodying the fea-15 tures of my invention, shown open. Fig. 2 is a view showing the manner of clasping the lids together with an adjustable clasp when, the album is closed. Fig. 3 is a view showing some of the various parts in detail.

Similar letters of reference refer to similar

parts throughout the several views.

In Fig. 1 of the drawings, A, B, and C represent respectively three pages of an album. The photographs or autograph cards are to be 25 arranged as shown at A, and are to be held in place on the page by small clips of brass or other suitable material, a a, b, and c, placed at the corners, as shown. The pieces a a, at the top, are simply small pieces of brass or other 30 material, cut out, as shown in Fig. 3, with small projections e e, which extend through the leaf of the book and are clinched on the other side. The pieces b are similar in form, but are made double, the upper and lower 35 parts being the same in shape, and the said clip b is held in place by the projections e e of the pieces a on the preceding page being clinched over their lower part, as shown in Fig. 3. The remaining corner-piece, c, is made 40 in the upper part, similar in shape to those already described, but having at the under

side a long shank, c', which slides under one of the projections e from the piece a on the preceding page, which is bent down over said shank in such a manner that it is allowed to 45 slide freely back and forth. In placing either a photograph or autograph card in place, three of the corners of said card are slipped under the clips a a and b, and the remaining clip, c, slipped over the remaining corner, thus hold- 50 ing the card firmly in its place and presenting a neat and attractive appearance. At B a modification of this mode of securing the cards in place is shown. Instead of the double clip b and sliding clip c at the bottom, a single 55 piece, d, is placed in the center of the bottom \cdot and arranged to turn on a rivet, d', after the manner of a "button."

D in Fig. 2 represents an adjustable clasp, which consists of a small coil-spring, s, 60 doubled and attached at each end to one lid, E, with the center looped over a pin, P, in the other lid, E'. By this arrangement the lids may be clasped together, no matter how full the album may become.

The blank leaf C, between the pages A and B, prevents the pictures from becoming scratched by contact with the clips a, b, and c.

Having thus described my invention, what I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters 70 Patent, is—

An album composed of the leaves A B and intermediate leaves, C, said leaves A and B being provided with metallic clips for holding cards, substantially as shown and described. 75
