HANDLE-CAP FOR TRAVELING-BAGS.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 271,803, dated February 6, 1883. Application filed May 22, 1882. (Model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, HENRY S. CRAUS, of of New York, have invented a new and useful 5 Improvement in Handle-Caps for Bags, Satchels, and Baskets, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description.

Reference is to be had to the accompanying drawings, forming a part of this specification, in 10 which similar letters of reference indicate cor-

responding parts in all the figures.

Figure 1 is a front elevation of my improvement. Fig. 2 is a sectional plan view of the same, taken through the line xx, Fig. 1. Fig. 3 is 15 a sectional front elevation of the same, taken through the line y y, Fig. 2. Fig. 4 is a side elevation of the same, partly in section, through the line zz, Fig. 2.

The object of this invention is to facilitate 20 the attachment of handles to bags, satchels, and baskets, and promote security in said at-

tachment.

The invention consists in a handle-cap for bags, satchels, and baskets constructed with 25 a cap to receive the end of the handle, a capplate attached to the bag, satchel, or basket, and provided with a slotted hollow projection to receive the connecting head and stem, whereby a firm, secure, and durable connection is 30 formed between the said handle and the said bag, satchel, or basket, as will be hereinafter fully described, and pointed out in the claim.

A represents a cap, which is fitted upon the end of a handle, and is secured in place by 35 nails or rivets in the ordinary manner.

B is the cap-plate, which is secured to the

frame of a bag, satchel, or basket in the ordi-

nary manner.

Brooklyn, in the county of Kings and State | In the middle part of the cap-plate B is formed a hollow upward projection, C, which is open 40 upon the lower side, and has a transverse slot, D, in its upper part. The projection C receives a ball, E, the stem F of which passes through the slot D and through a hole in the base of the cap A. The end of the stem F is 45 headed down or riveted within the cap A to form a firm connection.

> I am aware of the patents of E. Rumpp and A. Weinreich, dated November 12, 1878, No. 209,926, and O. Reichenbach, dated July 27, 50 1880, No. 230,572, for handle attachments for satchels, and I therefore lay no claim to such inventions, my invention being confined to the presise construction and arrangement of parts pointed out in the claim, whereby great cheap- 55 ness, simplicity, and compactness of construction are attained.

Having thus described my invention, I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters Patent-

In a handle-cap for traveling-bags, the com- 60 bination, with the cap A, having a hole in the center of its base, of the cap-plate B, provided with the hollow projection C, having the slot D in its upper end, and the ball E, provided with the shank F, riveted to the base-plate of 65 the cap A, substantially as and for the purpose set forth.
