

## BOOT-BLACKING CASE.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 276,542, dated April 24, 1883.

Application filed August 2, 1882. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, FRANK J. TRIGGS, of Massachusetts, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Boot-Blacking Cases, of which the following is a specification.

The object of my invention is to provide a cheap, simple, and convenient boot-blacking case, which shall occupy less space upon the 10 floor than those heretofore constructed; and it consists of an upright case provided with a hinged front portion or door, having hinged legs or supports adapted to rest upon the floor when the front portion is turned down, rest-15 ing horizontally, and upon which the foot may be placed to more conveniently black the boot or shoe thereon, the case being secured againstthe wall of the room or in any other convenient position for use, as hereinafter more fully 20 described, and set forth in the claim.

Figure 1 represents a side elevation of my invention secured in position against the wall and opened ready for use. Fig. 2 represents a front elevation of the same. Fig. 3 repre-25 sents a similar view of the same in a closed position.

A represents the back of a rectangular case, provided with sides B, bottom C, top E, and a hinged front or door, F, hinged to the front 30 or outer edge of the said bottom C, and provided with hinged or pivoted legs H, secured to the front or door F near its upper end, and which have a bearing upon the floor when the same is turned down for use, as shown in Figs. 35 1 and 2, being provided with a foot-rest, L, and blacking-box holder, the main case being provided with a shelf to hold brush, blackingbox, &c., when closed or not in use, as shown

It will be understood that the case thus con- 40 structed may be secured against any piece of Boston, in the county of Suffolk and State of | furniture—as an office-desk, table-leg, or other desired position—a single screw being sufficient to retain it in position when driven through the back of the case, as shown; or a 45 hook or nail may be temporarily provided or rigidly secured in proper position, and projecting sufficiently to permit the case to be temporarily suspended therefrom while in use, and then removed, or as occasion may require. 50

I am well aware that heretofore blackingcases have been constructed to fold up so as to form a seat, and that blacking-cases have been combined with bureaus, and that tables and cupboards have been connected together so 55 as to fold up and be inclosed by doors hinged to swing horizontally, and that seats have been constructed so as to be folded into a vertical position. Therefore I do not broadly claim a folding seat or foot-rest, but limit my inven- 65 tion to the particular device above described, and shown in the accompanying drawings.

Having thus described my invention, what I claim is—

A boot-blacking case consisting of a rect- 65 angular receptable or box adapted to be secured in a vertical position, and having a door hinged to the bottom thereof, provided with a pair of pivoted legs adapted to support the same in a horizontal position when the said 70 door is turned down to form a foot-rest, and to fold up when not in use, substantially as described, as and for the purposes set forth.
