








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PAPER BAG.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 277,153, dated May 8, 1883.
Application filed December 2, 1882. (Model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, JOHN P. ONDERDONK, of the city and county of Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Paper Bags; and I do hereby declare that the following is a true and exact description of the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, and to the letters of reference marked thereon.

10 The nature of my invention consists in the manner of pasting the bottom of the bag, as also the manner of cutting off the corners and pasting the bottom and corners of the bag.

15 Figure 1 represents a tube having each one of its two sides folded inwardly in a bellows fold, A A. The paste is applied on the inner side of the tube along the line B and dotted line C. The parts are then pasted together, giving the collapsed tube the form indicated

20 by Fig. 2. Fig. 3 represents the tube opened, and shows the form of the bottom of the bag. By cutting off the two bottom corners of the

tube, as represented in Fig. 4, and applying paste to the inner side of the tube, along the dotted line C and the line B, which conforms 25 to the dotted line C, another form of the bag is made, which is represented opened at Fig. 5, and shows the form of the bottom of the bag.

Having thus described my invention, what I 30 claim, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

1. A paper bag with each one of its two sides folded inwardly in a bellows fold and pasted or cemented together on its inner bot- 35 tom edges.

2. A paper bag with each one of its two sides folded inwardly in a bellows fold and its bottom corners cut off and pasted or cemented together on its inner bottom edges.
