

## SHIRT.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 277,744, dated May 15, 1883.

Application filed January 9, 1883. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Thomas Kimball, of Chicago, Cook county, and State of Illinois, have invented a new and Improved Reversible Shirt, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description.

The object of my invention is to provide a garment that may be worn to show a plain bosom, and when turned inside out exhibits to a laced or fancy bosom.

The invention consists in a shirt made with a bosom, as usual, and fitted at the back with flaps forming a separate laced bosom, as here-

Reference is to be had to the accompanying drawings, forming a part of this specification, in which similar letters of reference indicate corresponding parts in all the figures.

Figure 1 is a front view of the reversible shirt with the plain bosom outward. Fig. 2 shows the garment reversed, and Fig. 3 is a cross-section of the bosom portion.

The body A may be of any suitable material, either white or colored goods, of cotton, linen, or wool. Both sides may be plain or both figured; or one side may be figured. The bosom a is shown single and of usual construction; but it may be double, and the garment open at the back instead of at the front, as shown. b b are flaps attached at their edges

at the back of bosom a, and provided in their adjoining edges with eyelet-holes for the cord c. The cord is to be applied when the garment is worn with the bosom-flaps b at the outside; or, in case of a shirt opening at the back, the 35 lacing-cord may remain.

By this construction the shirt can be worn as an ordinary plain shirt, and by being turned inside out is converted to a fancy shirt of the style known as "lawn-tennis" or "yachting" 40 shirts. The construction whereby this object is obtained does not add materially to the expense, nor render the shirt inconvenient for wear.

I am aware that reversible or changeable 45 bosoms have been applied to shirts; but they do not present a neat appearance when worn.

Having thus described my invention, I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters Patent—
The one-piece bosom a attached at one side

The one-piece bosom a, attached at one side 50 to the shirt, buttoned thereto at the middle, and free at the other side, in combination with the shirt-body and the flaps b b, the latter eyeleted and arranged on the opposite side of the shirt material, as and for the purpose specified. 55
