

CLOTHES-LINE HOOK.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 281,260, dated July 17, 1883.

Application filed May 25, 1883. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, John B. Garfield, a citizen of the United States, residing at Elyria, in the county of Lorain and State of Ohio, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Clothes-Line Hooks, of which the following is a specification, reference being had therein to the accompanying drawing.

This invention has relation to improvements in devices for suspending clothes-lines; and it consists in the novel construction and arrangement of a hook, provided with a screw-threaded shank, adapted to be secured to a support, all as will be hereinafter more fully explained.

The annexed drawing, to which reference is made, fully illustrates my invention, in which the figure of the drawing represent a side view of my clothes-line hook.

Referring by letter to the accompanying drawing, A designates the hook, and a is the shank, which is screw-threaded, as at b, whereby the device is screwed into a support and held firmly in place. Said hook is constructed of one piece of metal, and the same is bent at c, at the forward end of the shank, rearwardly and slightly upwardly, leaving a space, d, between the shank and portion e, when the bar of metal is again bent at f, with the portion g extending forwardly, leaving a space, h, be-

30 extending forwardly, leaving a space, h, between the portion e and portion g, and the same is a third time bent, as at i, and ter-

minating in a rearwardly upwardly inclined portion, k, leaving a space, l.

It will be seen that the spaces d h l of 35 the hook are wedge-shaped, and that the clothes-line is placed in the space d and carried back over the portion e and within the second space, h, and again over the portion g through the space l, after which the line is 40 drawn, and the same will be held firmly by the hook, as, the spaces being wedge-shaped, the tighter the line is drawn the same will wedge itself within said spaces, thereby dispensing with clothes-props, and when the 45 rope is wedged within the spaces the same cannot slip; at the same time it can be easily applied and detached therefrom, and it is cheap to manufacture.

Having described my invention, what I 50 claim, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

A clothes-line hook formed of a single piece of metal, bent to form the two hooks, as shown, with the three intermediate wedge-shaped 55 spaces, adapted to receive and retain the cord, and provided with a screw-shank, all substantially as shown and described.
