

## ADVERTISING-FAN.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 290,827, dated December 25, 1883.

Application filed July 12, 1883. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Alfred Wiehl, of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Advertising-Fans, of which the following is

a specification.

This invention has reference to an improved advertising fan of novel and attractive design; and it consists of a fan the body of which is covered with a layer provided with openings, behind which a sliding piece, that complements a suitable picture on the covering layer, is arranged. The sliding piece is attached at one side by an elastic to the fanbody, and at the other side is provided with a string or other means, by which motion can be given to the sliding piece, and thus a transformation of the picture be produced.

In the accompanying drawings, Figures 1 and 2 represent front views of my improved advertising - fan, showing the slide-piece in different positions. Fig. 3 is a vertical transverse section through the center on line x x,

Fig. 1.

Similar letters of reference indicate the cor-

responding parts.

Referring to the drawings, A represents a fan, preferably a common Japanese fan, hav-

ing a hollow handle, A'.

A<sup>2</sup> is a covering layer, of paper, that is applied to one or both sides of the fan, and provided with a suitable picture, and furnished with openings a a.

Back of the openings a a a slide-piece, B, is guided, which slide-piece is so painted or printed as to complement the picture on the

covering layer or layers A<sup>2</sup> of the fan. The upper part of said slide-piece B is attached to the body of the fan by means of a piece of rubber, b, or other elastic material, while to its 40 lower part a string, B', is attached, which passes, preferably, through the hollow handle A', and has a ring, B<sup>2</sup>, attached to its outer end. By pulling at the string B' the slide-piece B is moved, so as to produce a trans-45 formation of the picture, whereby a comical or otherwise striking effect is produced.

In place of the string any other equivalent means for reciprocating the slide-piece may be

used.

The fan may be made in any desired design, and produces, in connection with its reciprocating slide-piece, an attractive and amusing effect, whereby the fan is specially adapted to advertising purposes.

Having thus described my invention, I claim as new and desire to secure by Letters Patent—

A fan, A, having a hollow handle, A', a suitable picture on a layer, A<sup>2</sup>, of paper furnished with openings a a, the slide-piece B back of 60 the openings, painted or printed to complement and complete the picture, the elastic b, attached to the slide-piece and the body of the fan, and the string B', extending through the handle, substantially as described.
